



From the Desk of Fr. Dan

"How long, O Lord?" Our first reading from the prophet Habakkuk begins with this powerful Old Testament phrase. It evokes a common human

struggle with God. If God is so good, if he loves us so much, then why are we so troubled and tormented here on this earth? How long must I put up with injustice, with evil seeming to conquer over good, with the world seeming so wrong?

As Christians we know the answer to this question. We know that evil is the result of sin and that God has destined us for better things in eternal life. When compared to eternity, our sufferings will seem very small and insignificant. However, when we are in pain or struggling, it is difficult to look past what is right before us and time seems to be endless.

I remember when I broke my arm on my bicycle in Rome and was sitting awaiting my X-ray. I must have waited for over 30 minutes in the waiting room (I had no timepiece but it was around a rosary and a half) but it felt like hours because I was in great pain the whole time. I look back now and it seems like a small blip of time. But while we are suffering – when we are crying out "How long, O Lord" – it seems unending and not much can console us.

This is why it is so important for Habakkuk to share the Lord's response to "how long":

The vision still has its time, pressed on to fulfillment, and will not disappoint; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late.

Our cry of "how long must I wait" is met with "it will not be late". We may not know exactly how long we must endure the pains of this life, but we know that God's answer will not be too late. Suffering can seem both interminable and unbearable. But God does not abandon us before we run out of strength – he does not allow us to suffer without also giving us the grace to endure and overcome it. If God seems to be far off at times, if he seems to delay, our counsel is this: wait for the Lord and have faith.

Respect Life Sunday

Today is Respect Life Sunday and the beginning of the month of October which is dedicated to focusing our thoughts on the sanctity of life, which should be a priority for each and every one of us. Today, popular culture promotes a dangerous myth - exalting the freedom and glamour of the rich and famous, the powerful or "beautiful" people, whose public lives seem superficial and whose private lives feature a succession of brief and broken relationships. All too often they end up in treatment for drug or alcohol addiction, usually after injuring others or humiliating themselves publicly. But until then, in the eyes of the world, they have it all! And don't we often feel like we want it all? And we want it now! According to this myth, money equals freedom. It makes us free to sample from the whole rich smorgasbord of summer delights - the latest electronics and trendy fashions. We are invited to be constantly entertained by new places and new experiences, the latest music or latest video games. For some people, acquaintances pass in and out of their lives, but they rarely have the time to know and love them deeply, to know the longings of their hearts, the goodness of their souls. When other people make demands on our freedom, we can choose to ignore or even eliminate from our self-centered lives. Our culture gives us "permission" to turn our back on an ill-timed baby, a neglected spouse or a mother in a nursing home who pleads for a visit. But money can't buy us love. And neither power nor freedom can bring us the one thing humans need to thrive. We were created to love and be loved. We cannot be satisfied by earthly things alone. By creating us in his own image, God has given us a nature that is partly spiritual - an intellect, the capacity to know right from wrong, the free will to choose how to act, and the capacity to know and love him. Jesus' incarnation, life and death revealed to us that God is Love. To love God and others fulfills our deepest needs, allowing us to have life "to the fullest." Every person bears God's image and has an immortal soul. Yet many are viewed as being outside the circle of love - unborn children whose parents are tempted to eliminate them, vulnerable people with illnesses and disabilities who risk being abandoned or even killed through misguided "mercy," prisoners on death row, forgotten or despised long after they have repented of their wrongdoing. Although it seems a paradox, the greater the sacrifices made out of love, the greater is our joy and peace. Whether it is the brave decision of a pregnant woman to reject abortion and allow a loving family to parent her child when she cannot, or the daily sacrifices of parents in raising young children, or the hard work of caring for an elderly relative with dementia, when we step up to these challenges, God can stretch our hearts and fill them to overflowing with his love, joy, and peace. With hearts so transformed, we can become living witnesses to the meaning of Jesus' mission: *I came that all might have life, and have it to the full!*



This Tuesday, October 4, is the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi.

The church of Francis' day was wealthy and powerful, and most people did not have the courage to take the words of the gospels literally. But Francis followed Christ's example. He became the "Poverello" -the "little poor one." He owned only one tunic, a plain brown robe with a rope for a belt, which was the garment worn by peasants when they labored in the fields. He worked with lepers, the most despised people of society. He acted as a peacemaker between warring towns. Soon others began to join Francis, earning their bread by working in the field or by doing odd jobs. Francis had an understanding of the unity of all creation that was way ahead of its time. He addressed every created thing as a Brother or Sister and treated everything with reverence. He allowed the beauty of creation to fill him with joy. Francis became ill and died when he was only 45 years old. On his deathbed he composed the Canticle of the Sun, a hymn of praise still sung to this day. Then, he asked to be laid on Brother Earth naked so that he could welcome Sister Death as simply as possible. The pope who canonized him two years later described him as "the most perfect image of Christ." His body rests in the basilica that was built as Assisi after his death. Francis of Assisi is a patron saint of Italy. In 1979, he was also named patron saint of ecologists and all people who work to protect the environment. **In keeping with the tradition of the Feast Day we will have a blessing of animals, Tuesday, October 4th at 6:15pm at St. Pius X parking lot.** All parishioners and friends are invited to bring their pets and other animals to this blessing service.
