During my first year in Rome, I was invited by a small group of my classmates to go skiing with them. I am not what I'd call an avid skier, but I knew that if I didn't go skiing at least once in the Alps while I was there, it would be a mistake. So, my friends

found an Airbnb in a small town called Falcade in the Italian Dolomites, we rented a car, and up we went.

We rang the doorbell on the little house and a tiny *nonna* answered the door. She didn't speak any English, so we got by with our fledgling Italian. It didn't take her long to ask if we were seminarians – seminarians tend to stick out like a sore thumb. After hearing our answer, she said, "Well, I'm Pope John Paul I's niece." I think we asked her to repeat herself, since we didn't think we understood her correctly. Apparently, he grew up right down the street in Canale d'Agordo and celebrated all of his sacraments and his first Mass in the small parish church there. So, one evening, we walked there for daily Mass. The priest noticed that we were visiting and offered to show us some of John Paul I's artifacts – family photos, vestments, letters, and the like. They were working on creating a museum for his effects, but for us they were just sitting in a room where we could get up close. It was amazing.

The irony of this is that only a year before I had been given a book by a religious sister written by John Paul I. He didn't have any time as pope to write (34 days) but as the Patriarch of Venice he wrote some magazine articles that have been collected and translated into a book called *Illustrissimi*. I read the book and greatly enjoyed his writing and teaching style. So, that was the second time in less than a year that I encountered John Paul I. I believe that was no coincidence. I have found that the saints truly find us more often than we find them. It should not surprise us that some saints develop a certain fondness for us, whether it's because we have a kindred spirit or a similar upbringing or who knows what else. Some people are just easier for us to get along with on this earthly life. Why would it be any different for those enjoying the bliss of heaven? I "met" John Paul I when he was only a Servant of God – the first step toward canonization. He is now Blessed John Paul I and only a miracle away from being canonized as a saint of the Church. Even though I never met him, he has been a great teacher and intercessor for me. I believe he's in heaven and I'm just waiting for official approval.

During the month of November as we commemorate the dead, I encourage you to get to know some of the saints a bit more. They are our brothers and sisters in Christ. They are members of the Church. They ran the race and kept the faith and now they inspire us to do the same and pray for us to God just as we pray for one another. Some of them already may know you and are just waiting for you to get to know them.

This Friday, November 11 is Veterans Day.

In the early years of the 20th century, a war called the Great

War involved most of the countries of the earth. Millions died as a result of new and terrible weapons. Everyone hoped that it was the “war to end all wars.” A very special time was chosen as the hour when the guns would be stilled and peace declared; the eleventh day of the eleventh month. By this choice, the signers of the peace treaty suggested that human kind had waited until it was nearly too late. The war would come to be known as the First World War. The day chosen for the beginning of peace was special for another reason. It was the Memorial of St. Martin of Tours. Martin had been a soldier in the army until he laid down his weapons. His feast day, Martinmas, was a celebration of peace. That day had also been a thanksgiving festival in Europe since the Middle Ages. Now there was even more reason to be thankful. In the USA, this day is called Veterans Day. All Americans who have fought in wars since that time, those who survived, as well as those who died are honored. Spend some time recalling all of the Veterans from our towns and say a prayer of thanksgiving for the gift of service they gave to our country and us. Then visit a cemetery and say a prayer to our deceased Veterans who are buried there.

November

The name for the eleventh month really means “the ninth month.” In the ancient Roman calendar November was the ninth month because the year began in March. In church tradition, November is a month to remember the dead and to pray for them. The month begins with All Saints’ Day and All Souls’ Day. Either in the last days of November or the first days of December, the season of Advent begins. In folklore, November had a strange name. It was called “Gossamer,” which means “goose summer.” That meant something like Indian Summer, which is a time of warm weather after the first frost. St. Martin’s Day, the 11th day of the 11th month, was a time to feast on roast goose. Perhaps that’s where “goose summer” comes from.



The Second Collection next weekend (November 12-13) is for the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA.

The Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA (AMS) was established by Saint John Paul II in 1985 to provide the Catholic Church’s full range of pastoral ministries to those in the United States Armed Forces. The mission of the Archdiocese is to “serve those who serve” by providing the same pastoral care and services as any other Catholic diocese to Catholics serving in the United States Armed Forces, enrolled in the U.S. Military Academies, undergoing treatment at any of the 153 Department of Veterans Affairs’ Medical Center in the U.S. Puerto Rico and Guam, working in civilian jobs for the federal government beyond U.S. borders, and the families of these populations. Programs and services vital to the unique mission and ministry of the Archdiocese include Vocations, Evangelization and Catechesis, Sacramental Records, Tribunal and Veterans Affairs. The AMS receives no funding from the military or the government in support of the aforementioned programs and relies solely on private donors. The AMS annual operating budget is over \$6.8 million, which includes the cost of maintaining an archive of more than 3 million sacramental records, a tribunal to adjudicate marriage annulments and other issues of canon law, and a religious education and faith-formation program. Please be as generous as you can to help the Catholic Church to “serve those who serve.” Thank you.

The collection for Retired Religious and Diocesan Priests will be conducted in our diocese this weekend, November 5-6.

Your support for this appeal for the retirement fund for religious and diocesan priests and all of our brothers and sisters in Christ, present and past, who have dedicated their lives to prayer, ministry and service is appreciated. The indomitable spirit of religious enable them to build schools, hospitals and much of the social service infrastructure of this country. Religious helped establish the institutions that enable millions of Catholics to engage in the mainstream of our country's industry and economy. Today, the majority of women and men religious are past age 60; a significant number are past age 80. Many institutions simply do not have the resources to meet the dramatically escalating costs of care for their growing populations of elderly. Their traditions of service to others are deeply entrenched and ongoing. During the appeal, please recall the role of religious in your life; the ways that they have nourished your faith and defined and strengthened your values. The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

This Wednesday, November 9, we celebrate The Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome.

We honor a church that counts the world within its parish boundaries. The basilica of St. John

Lateran is the cathedral of Rome. That means it is the church of the Rome bishop, who is the pope. And so St. John Lateran is a spiritual home of Catholics everywhere.

The earliest Christians met in homes. When that became too dangerous in Rome because of persecutions, they met secretly in underground burial places called catacombs. That situation didn't change until the fourth century, when the emperor Constantine made Christianity the official religion of the Roman Empire. Constantine made generous gifts of property to the church of Rome. Among them was a palace with grounds that had once belonged to the Laterani family. In 324, he added to the site a large rectangular building that could be used for public gatherings. It was called a basilica, which means, literally, a building fit for a king. It was to be a Christian church and was called the Basilica of the Savior. Legend says that the basilica was dedicated on November 9 that year. The baptistery was dedicated to St. John the Baptist, and generations later the whole building was dedicated to John, so it became known as St. John of the Lateran. The Lateran basilica remind us of our history as a people. It is filled with treasured Christian relics. Its high altar is built over a wooden table on which Peter himself is said to have celebrated the Lord's Supper with the Christian community of Rome. However, on this November feast day, we celebrate not a building but a loving God who provides a home for us on earth and in heaven. According to St. Paul, we are God's building. We are living stones that are built up into God's house.
