

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From the Desk of Fr. Dan

It's New Year's Resolution time! Resolutions to do better are a healthy part of Christian living. It is connected to Jesus' command to “be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect.” (Mt 5:48) God calls us daily to conversion of heart. It has long been a Catholic tradition to perform a daily examination of conscience, usually at the end of the day, to consider our actions of the day and to consider how we can improve. New Year's Resolutions are just another tool to accomplish this lofty goal.

I think there are two main reasons why so many of us focus on diet and exercise every year. The first is because we very reliably perform an “examination of body” when we look in a mirror and get dressed every day. It becomes painfully obvious that our body is not the way it “should” be (at least in our own eyes). The second reason is that our society and culture have made it acceptable to examine our bodies and seek its improvement. We can look around and readily find an unfavorable comparison – just about every magazine, billboard, and website has an example of a body type we might aspire to have. And because our body is the most obvious way that we project ourselves to the world, our bodies are our billboards – and we want to look good!

Resolving to get in better physical shape is not necessarily the most important thing to change about ourselves. We are far more than our bodies. Our minds and souls cannot be neglected during our self-examination. Our personal health is connected to our entire selves and when one part of us is sick, the whole person suffers.

Perhaps this year is an opportunity to think outside of the bodily box the New Year's Resolution often creates. Have you been neglecting the health of your mind? Perhaps this is a year to read that book you've always wanted to read or to try learning a new language or musical instrument. Or, perhaps there is something from your past that you have been avoiding or haven't dealt with properly. Maybe this is the year to see someone about it.

Many of us also realize the need to pray or read Scripture more often. Being spiritually healthy can make a profound difference when other parts of our health begin to fail us. Maybe this is the year to work on your relationship with God and commit to a deeper prayer life.

Statistics show that around 80% of New Year's resolutions fail and most fail by around mid-February. No matter our intentions, we are broken people and need help to succeed. Above all, we need God's help and grace to get through those difficult days when our resolutions seem distant and unimportant. This is why it's important to involve others with our resolutions. Share yours with someone and ask for their help in accomplishing your goals. Being accountable to someone else helps us to stay committed. I suspect that Jesus sent his disciples out two by two for that reason.

No matter what your resolution might be – for a better body, mind, or soul – I wish you blessings in this upcoming year as we seek to become more perfect together in 2023.



Today, January 1, is the Feast of Mary, Mother of God

Some people think that Christmas is one holiday and New Year's is another holiday, but the church keeps the first of January as one of the days of Christmastime. The rejoicing of December 25

belongs to January 1 as well. The gospel for Mass on January 1 is short as well. But it gives us the reason for the many different titles that the first of January has held over the years. The gospel, from the second chapter of Luke, is a continuation of the story we began at Midnight Mass on Christmas, Today, we hear that the shepherds did what the angels told them to do. They found Mary and Joseph and the newborn Jesus. Then they went to tell their neighbors that a Savior was born. Many treasured what was said about the Child. In joy, the shepherds sang the angels' song of glory in heaven and peace on earth. Eight days after His birth, Jesus was circumcised and received His name, which means "Savior." January 1 is World Day for Peace. For Roman Catholics, today is the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. This Solemnity is over 1,500 years old on the church's calendar. We celebrate the fulfillment of the promise made to Mary by the angel Gabriel. God's Child is now Her Child. Mary is the Mother of God.



Home Blessing Kits

The Epiphany, the oldest of the Christmas feasts, is also known as Three Kings Day for the three magi who found the Christ Child after following a star to Bethlehem. We celebrate the Epiphany January 8, 2023. The blessing of the home is a popular Epiphany custom. Using chalk, many households mark their entrance door with the current year and with the inscription CMB, the initials of Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, the traditional names of the magi. The inscription also stands for the Latin phrase Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which means "Christ, bless this home." **To observe this special feast of the Christmas season, blessing kits will be available in both churches December 31st & January 1st.**

Orthodox Christmas is celebrated on Saturday, January 7

Shortly after Jesus was born, Roman mathematicians created a new calendar. It was called the Julian calendar because the emperor, Julius Caesar, ordered that it must be used throughout the Empire. The calendar is almost like the one we use today. The Julian calendar was an improvement over the calendars used before it. Still, as the centuries passed, people noticed that something was wrong. The solstices and the equinoxes, which mark the beginnings of the season, were occurring a few days too late. By the year 1500, the seasons were 10 days off from where they started out in Caesar's time. If this was allowed to continue, eventually it would be summer on January 1. Pope Gregory XII asked his mathematicians to create a more accurate calendar. The result was the Gregorian calendar, named in his honor. That's the calendar we use today. The new calendar was ready in 1582, but because of disagreements among the Protestant, Orthodox and Catholic Churches, many countries didn't adopt it right away. England and its colonies didn't begin using the new calendar until 1752. When a country started to keep time by the Gregorian calendar, they would need to skip ten days. For instance, the day after October 5 would become October 15. This confused some people, who thought their lives would be ten days shorter! May Orthodox Churches still use the "old style" Julian calendar to set the dates of feasts. But almost all the countries of the world use the Gregorian calendar for business dealings. There is now a 13 day difference between the two calendars. So today, January 7 on the Gregorian calendar is December 25, Christmas Day, on the Julian calendar. In Russia, where most Christians are members of the Orthodox church, January 7 is Christmas. People greet each other with the words **"Khristos rozhdayetsia! Christ is born!"**

This Wednesday, January 4, is the Feast Day of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (married woman, religious founder 1174-1821)

All her life, Elizabeth Ann Seton loved to conquer challenges. In a way, that was true even after her death. She is the first person to be declared a saint who was born in what would soon become the United States of America. Elizabeth was born in New York City. Her parents were wealthy and well-educated Episcopalians. They believed in helping the poor, and they taught her to do so from the time she was a small child. She later married a successful businessman and they began a family. Elizabeth still found time to do important volunteer work. She founded the Society for the Relief of Poor Widows with Small Children. By the time Elizabeth was 30 years old, her situation had changed completely. Her husband lost his business, grew seriously ill and died. Now she herself was a widow with young children. During her husband's illness, encouragement from Catholic friends had consoled her. She decided to become a Catholic, although in doing so she lost the support of her wealthy family. As a single parent with five children to care for, she had no way to earn a living. However, soon she was invited to begin a school for young girls from poor families. The school was founded, near Baltimore, Maryland, was the first Catholic school in the United States. With 18 other dedicated women, Elizabeth went on to organize the first group of women religious in the United States, the Sisters of Charity. Elizabeth Ann Seton accomplished all this in a very short life. She died when she was in her late 40's. The Catholic school system that she founded now thrives all over North America.

As the Sisters of Charity at Seton Hill and Caritas Christi celebrate the feast day of their foundress, we as a parish extend our prayers and well-wishes to all the sisters on this special day. Numerous Sisters of Charity have touched our lives in so many ways. May God continue to bless them as they continue His work.

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New Year's Day
On New Year's Eve, some people "pray in" the new year. Church bells peel out the old and ring in the new. With noisemakers and fireworks, people make a racket to try to scare away their troubles. The

next morning, many people attend church services. It is the Roman Catholic Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God, the Lutheran and Episcopalian feast of the Holy Name of Jesus and the Byzantine feast of the Circumcision of Jesus. In Greece, January 1 is also called St. Basil's Day. A bread, *vasilopita*, is baked with a coin in it, whoever gets the coin is crowned queen or king for the new year. (The name Basil means royalty.) In some countries, January 1 is the official day to exchange Christmastime gifts. Everywhere, feasting is customary. In Japan, where pink and red are colors of good fortune, a pink fish called red snapper is served. Strawberries are eaten as a taste of spring. In many European countries, a dinner of roast pork is supposed to being a bountiful year. Swedes drink a toast to the new year with *glogg* - hot spiced wine. In the southern and southwestern United States, black-eyed peas are cooked in a traditional New Year's dish called Hoppin' John. On this day, people visit friends to settle any misunderstandings from the precious year. People also call on the folks they want to spend time with during the next year. In some families, parents bless their children. Many people pay a visit to their Godparents. Hospitality is the rule of the day. At the new year, many people make a special effort to be loving and outgoing. Perhaps extra goodwill on this day is a Christmastime hope that this spirit will last all year long.
