

**January 8, 2023 - The Epiphany of the Lord**



The word “Epiphany” comes from the Greek *epiphaino*, a verb that means “to shine upon,” “to manifest,” or “to make known.” Thus, the feast of the Epiphany celebrates the many ways that Christ has made Himself known to the world. Mainly the three events that manifested the mission and divinity of Christ: the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12), the baptism of Jesus Christ (Mark 1:9-11) and the miracle at Cana (John 2:1-11).

Desk of  
Fr. Dan*

When people hear that I grew up in Greensburg, many assume that I went to Greensburg Central Catholic. I did not. I am a Hempfield grad. I went to Holy Cross School through 5<sup>th</sup> grade and then public school from 6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade before going to Saint Vincent College. One does not need to go to a Catholic school their whole lives to be a faithful Catholic or to become a priest.

That being said, it is becoming more and more difficult to do so. When I was going to high school, the internet was brand new and not as accessible. We had no smart phones, no YouTube, and no TikTok. Nearly all of my friends grew up going to church at least occasionally, if not regularly, even if they weren't all Catholic. Although no one overtly talked about Christianity in school, it was in the very air that I breathed, both at home and at school. That is no longer true for most young people. Most young people spend a lot of their time absorbing things from the internet and most portrayals of Catholicism on the internet are focused on its negative aspects. It is very easy for a young person to only see and hear about the downsides of organized religion. Many of the moral teachings of the Church that are hard to accept and are often misconstrued become the focal points on the internet and provide an excuse to reject the faith entirely. Sometimes I wonder if I had access to the same information growing up if I would have continued going to church. Maybe I wouldn't even be Catholic, let alone be a priest.

Young people have many voices clamoring in the world for their attention and their curious minds are hungry for knowledge and truth. While these things can be found online and on social media, they are hidden amid so much clutter. It seems to me that we cannot rely on the "air we breathe" to form our young people in the truths of the faith anymore. We need to be intentional about learning and living our faith.

Our parish has faith formation for young people on Tuesday nights from 6:00-7:30, with K-5 and 6-8 alternating every other week. We have a pretty good turnout weekly, but considering the number of young Catholics in our public schools, we should be seeing more. If you are a family with school-age children, I invite you to a new year's resolution of being more intentional about passing on your faith to your children. Above all else, this means bringing them to Mass every Sunday. I cannot stress the importance of this enough. It is more important than faith formation. This is how their hearts will be formed to know and love Jesus and the Church most fully and completely. Then, also bring them to faith formation nights. This is how their minds will be formed to be able to answer the questions about their faith that the world will pose them. I know the sacrifices many families make to have children involved in sports, dance, and other extracurriculars. As good as these things are, they are passing things. Our faith in Christ is eternal. Consider this when you are thinking about what your family makes a priority. ### **Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord**

This feast is an important event in Christ's life which brought about a change in the world which affects our lives today. It's hard to talk about Epiphany without sounding like we're exaggerating. Today is a day of superlatives. Epiphany is the grandest, merriest, brightest and best day of Christmastime. According to legend, the Wise Men were considered royal personages. The names were traditionally given as Melchior, Casper and Balthasar. Melchior was supposedly an old man with long hair and a white beard. His gift of gold was said to be testimony to the royalty of Christ. Caspar is usually pictured as young and beardless. Tradition says his gift of incense was a token of Christ's divine nature. Balthasar is pictured with a black complexion and a full beard. The myrrh he held is said to have prefigured the death of Christ. Epiphany means "appearance" and "revelation" and "manifestation." In the Gospel stories of Epiphany, we hear that God appears in creation. God is revealed in a star, in the waters of the river, in the shining skies, on the wings of a dove, in stone jars of everyday water. In many families, a famous Epiphany tradition is to have a party in honor of the visit of the Magi. A special cake in which a bean or coin has been hidden is served. The lucky person who finds the bean or coin in his or her slice of cake is crowned queen or king for the evening! This person leads everyone in the dancing procession that tops off the fun. The head of the House has two major responsibilities. One is to host the Carnival party before Lent begins. The other is to lead the blessing of the home for the New Year. The numerals of the year are written with chalk over the front door. The initials of the legendary names of the Magi are added - Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar. The home is dedicated to hospitality. In a sense, at Epiphany all of us are queens and kings. In Baptism, we were anointed to be God's royal people. Now the star shines over us, we who are Baptized, we who bear the name of Christ.

Wait until the end of the reading and enter during the Responsorial Psalm or the Alleluia. Likewise, during the homily... wait until it's over before walking down the aisle.


## Tomorrow, Monday, January 9, we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

When Advent began we heard the words of Isaiah: "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down!" Jesus goes into the Jordan River to be baptized by John. Suddenly the skies open. God's Spirit comes down in the form of a dove. Then God speaks for everyone to hear: "This is my beloved."

In the fifth century, Bishop Maximus of Turin wrote that we have every reason to celebrate this day with the joy of Christmas: "At Jesus' birth, His Mother, Mary, held her child close to her heart. So, the Father holds His beloved Son for all people to adore. Jesus is baptized so all Christians may follow Him with confidence."

In Hebrew, the name of Jesus is Joshua. This name means Savior. A thousand years before the time of Jesus, in the days of the Exodus, after Moses died, a man named Joshua became the leader of the Hebrew people. Joshua led the people through the Jordan River and into the Promised Land.

Our Savior Jesus is a new Joshua. Jesus leads us into the Jordan of baptism. We pass through the water to enter a new life. Sweetened dairy foods such as cheesecake and eggnog are customary during Christmastime in honor of our Savior, who leads us into "a land flowing with milk and honey."



## This Friday, January 13, is The Feast of St. Hilary, bishop, doctor of the Church (c.315-368).

Hilary, may have become a saint because of one simple practice. He began every conversation and action with a prayer. He was able to do great things that way. Hilary was born in the city of Poitiers in Gaul (now part of France). His parents were wealthy pagans, but he decided as a young man that he couldn't believe in a whole collection of gods. He believed there must be only one God who had created everything. Hilary discovered the scriptures and became a Christian.

At age 35, Hilary was chosen bishop of Poitiers. At that time, bishops were elected by the local clergy and then acclaimed by all the people of the community. Hilary, a humble person, tried to decline the honor, but this made him seem like an even better choice to the people of his diocese.

Hilary soon became known as a wise leader. He was also a great speaker. Unfortunately, the emperor decided that Hilary was a troublemaker, and he had the bishop exiled. Hilary spent three years in Phrygia (now central Turkey). Although, he suffered many hardships, he remained cheerful, which is the meaning of his name. He spent this time writing a great work on the Trinity. He also wrote the earliest known Latin hymns.

Finally, Hilary was allowed to return to Gaul. The whole city of Poitiers turned out to cheer him when he arrived. He spent the rest of his life writing. He has been honored with the title "Doctor of the Divinity of Christ" (the word "doctor" here means "wise teacher").

### Why is there a one-hour fast before Mass? Is gum included in the fast?

The one-hour Eucharistic fast was announced by Pope Paul VI in 1964 and written into the Code of Canon Law in 1983. All food and drink, except for water and medicine, are to be abstained from for at least one hour before reception of Holy Communion. Possible exceptions from the Eucharistic fast are the elderly, ill, and those who care for them. It is not unusual for us to refrain from eating in anticipation of an excellent meal. The Most Holy Eucharist is the most excellent meal in which we can partake. When we receive Holy Communion, we are receiving the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ. Tertullian, a theologian of the early Church, taught that the Eucharist is to be taken "before all food," as a sign of its excellence (*Imemsaе Caritatis*, #3). By observing the Eucharist fast, we are preparing our bodies and soul to share in the heavenly feast of the Mass. Gum is classified as a food and as such is included in the Eucharistic fast. Imagine coming to your mother's dinner table with gum in your mouth!
