It is not in vogue to believe in the existence of the devil. Because of popular shows like *Supernatural*, it's become very common for people to believe in the existence of angels, demons, and a spiritual realm. However, I don't think people believe that they have anything to do with some divine war between the forces of good and evil. This is not what we believe as Catholic Christians. Not only are we a part of this divine war, we are the focal point of it. When God created the spiritual beings, they were given free will just like us. However, because they are purely spiritual beings and could see God in His fullness at their creation, they already made their choice for or against God. Those who chose for God we call angels; those who chose against God we call demons. And the greatest spiritual being that God ever created, called Lucifer or Satan or the devil, in his pride chose against God. Because we cannot see God in His fullness until our death, our choice still lies before us when we die. Until then, we can choose against God again and again and be forgiven. This is the power of the sacrament of reconciliation and why the devil hates it with all his might – he cannot know forgiveness and he is jealous of us who can be forgiven. I think that all of us want to choose for God when the time comes. However, our life's decisions impact our ability to choose well in that moment. The more we turn from God, the harder it will be to choose Him when we die. The devil knows this, so he attempts to convince us to turn away from God as much as possible. The popular image of an angel on one shoulder and a devil on the other is not too far from the truth. Our very self is a battlefield for the forces of good and evil. And the stakes couldn't be higher – our very soul itself.

The devil is very powerful and influential. However, he is only the second most powerful being in existence. The most powerful is God, the blessed Trinity. With Him, and only with Him, we can win. Jesus proved that he had power over demons. By the grace of God, especially sacramental grace, we conquer the forces of evil in ourselves and our tendency to choose against God.

Remember that daily you are participating in a divine struggle for your immortal soul. The devil is strong and will try to convince you to make the same choice that he did. By your prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent – and the whole year long – you are doing things that will help you on your day of reckoning to choose God over anything and everything else with which the devil might tempt you.

## LENTEN GUIDELINES

**ABSTINENCE:** Catholics in the U.S. age 14 and older are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. The Church law forbids use of meat, but does not prohibit eggs, milk products or condiments made with animal fat.

**FASTING:** Catholics in the U.S., from the day after their 18th birthday until the day after their 59th birthday, are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The Church law allows for only one full meal a day, but does not prohibit the taking of some food in the morning and evening. The combined quantity of the two meals should not exceed the quantity eaten at the full meal. The drinking of ordinary liquids does not break the fast. Note: Persons taking medication or with health concerns should follow their doctor's advice.

**PRAY/ALMSGIVING:** Abstinence and fasting should lead Catholics to a deeper prayer life. Almsgiving provides an opportunity for a deeper understanding and response to the needs of the poor.

God, my Friend, purge me of all that is petty, puritanical, peevish, pinch-hearted. Give me the susceptibility Jesus always had. Tragically, we Christians bicker among ourselves about such trivia. Make us comprehend and own that Christ is so much more important than critiques. Abba, finding and forgiving is all I'm for. Amen.

## **This Friday, March 3, is the Feast Day of St. Katharine Drexel (1858-1955)**

She is a contemporary of some of us in our parish. Katharine Drexel was from a wealthy and well-known Philadelphia family. Her parents were good to the poor. Her father made large donations to charity and her mother helped poor families to pay their rent every month. As a child, Katharine reflected in this. She wanted to help the poor when she grew up but wasn't sure how to do so. Katharine and her family traveled all over the United States and Europe. On one unforgettable trip, the Drexels traveled to the state of Washington on a private train. Katharine was shocked by the poverty she saw on Indian reservations there. Later, while visiting Rome, the family spoke with Pope Leo XIII. Katharine begged him to send missionaries to help neglected Native American communities like the one she has seen. To her shock, he said, "My child, why don't you become a missionary yourself?" Eventually, Katharine Drexel did just that. Then, as always, talented and committed workers were more urgently needed than donations. In 1891, with 13 other women, she funded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. They worked to provide for the needy, and over time Katharine donated 12 million dollars of the fortune she had inherited. Katharine and her sisters first opened a boarding school for Pueblo Indian students in Santa Fe, New Mexico. In time, they founded missions for Indians in 16 states. They began a secondary school for African American students in New Orleans. This school was the forerunner of Xavier University (Other universities in the South were not open to black students in those days because of segregation laws.) In the years after the First World War, when African American people moved from the South to work in northern cities, the sisters also started schools in Chicago, Boston and New York City. It wouldn't have been easy to recognize Reverend Mother Katharine as the same person who had once toured the West on a private train. As she traveled across the country spending her fortune on new schools, she tried to live as simply as she could. Her clothing was threadbare. She bought the least expensive railroad tickets and carried her lunch in a brown paper bag, Katharine Drexel died in 1955 at the age of 96. People of all races from across the United States journeyed to Philadelphia to attend her funeral.

### **Jesus As Teacher** **Be Ready for Surprises**

What are your memories of school? Dull classes and tons of homework? Or a feeling of learning something new? When we look to Jesus as teacher, it should be with expectation. We may find a new challenge or again new insights. Jesus surprised people with His words and with His actions. He gave blessings, not to the powerful, but to the meek, the poor and those who felt persecuted. The old religious requirement was to keep oneself pure by not associating with people who had sinned. Jesus sat and ate with those whom society had cast out. Many people thought that fasting was essential for the religious life, but Jesus and His disciples did not fast. He allowed essential work on the Sabbath. Is Jesus saying that, rather than being limiting and restricting, true faith sets us free? To be sure, there are things that faith calls us to avoid, but Jesus seems more interested in providing new possibilities. Notice, however, that this is all centered in a particular kind of spirit. Jesus used His freedom to guide people to a more creative life. He said, in effect, that our Creator God wants us to share in the creative process. Perhaps, this is one of the things to which the Lenten season calls us. What possibilities are open to us? Beyond keeping the standards of honesty and the caring of self-giving love, what opportunities does God reveal? Perhaps we can see the true worth of someone right around us, whom we often ignore. Perhaps, we could speak up on issues we feel strongly about, but have never mentioned. Perhaps, we could listen more fully, being ready to change some long-held ideas. Jesus calls us to be open to new possibilities. It may seem easier to stay in our rut; it has become comfortable. But Dr. Laurence Peter in the last century said, "A rut is a grave with the ends knocked out." If we open ourselves up to a new possibilities, what might be open to us?

## Fasting for Spiritual Athletes

Asceticism, the practice of spiritual self-discipline, can sometimes bring to our minds today a disagreeable or sour-faced outlook on life. One important part of this self-discipline is our fasting, modeled on Christ, who fasted in the desert before beginning his public ministry. The word *ascesis* means “training” and comes from the Greek training of Olympic athletes. As Olympic athletes train their bodies to excel, so asceticism trains our souls to excel. Asceticism trains the muscles of the soul just as exercises train the muscles of the body. Athletes excel at bodily activities, such as swimming, running and gymnastics. What do spiritual athletes excel at? The saints are our spiritual athletes and they excel at love, prayer, generosity and faith. As you build up your spiritual muscles by fasting this Lent, set aside a little time to nourish yourself by reading the lives of these spiritual athletes. They were flawed but still knew they were wonderfully graced. Let their stories comfort and inspire you. These are biographies of holy men and women who lived in more recent times: Archbishop Oscar Romero, Mother Teresa, and Dorothy Day are but a few. The lives of these three bring into sharp focus the Lenten habits of fasting, charity and prayer - habits that energized them to pursue lives that helped the poor and oppressed.
