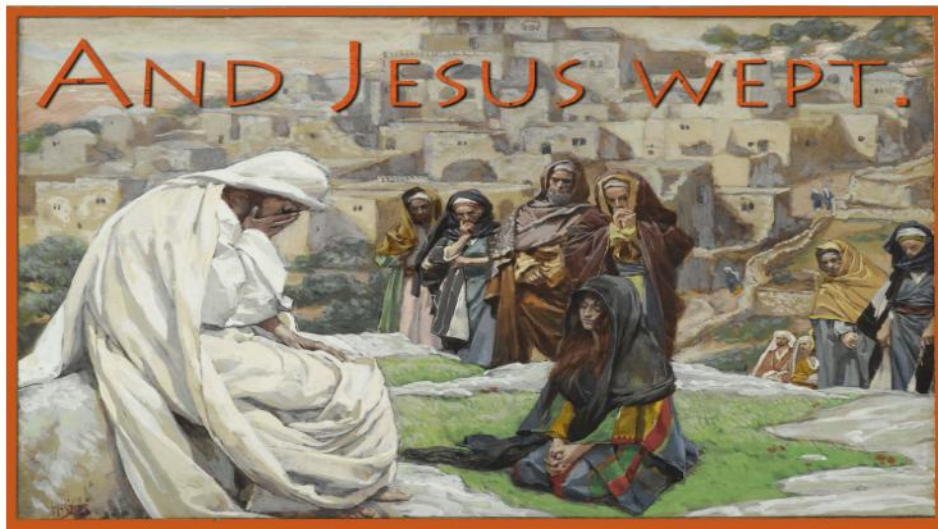

*From the Desk of Fr. Dan*

Martha and Mary, the two sisters of Lazarus, are featured in only two stories of Scripture, but these two stories exemplify the differences that can exist between siblings. In Luke 10:38-42,

Martha is busy in the kitchen with the serving and Mary is sitting at the feet of Jesus, listening to Him. Martha criticizes her sister for not helping and gets scolded by Jesus because Mary “has chosen the better part.” Here we can imagine Martha as a Type-A, no-nonsense, hard working woman and Mary as the quiet one, introspective and thoughtful. In this story, their differences are contrasted and it leads to conflict between them – something I’m sure that every one of us has experienced.

In John’s Gospel, we see the two women contrasted again but to different effect. Both are mourning the death of their brother, Lazarus. When they approach Jesus, both say the exact same thing – *Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.* Then, the differences begin.

After Martha says this, she follows it up by saying: *but even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you.* Jesus then engages her in discussion. They talk it out. Their discourse leads to Martha making one of the most profound professions of faith recorded in Scripture: *I have come to believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world.*

Then Mary gets a turn. *Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.* Mary says nothing more. She falls to her knees and weeps. There is no further discourse. It is at this moment that Jesus responds by weeping with her.

Jesus was present to Martha and Mary in two vastly different ways, but the result was profound and beautiful in both cases. Both the discourse with Martha and the weeping with Mary are expressions of God’s love and concern for his friends – two very different expressions that reflected the sisters’ different personalities and different needs in their grief.

Each of us has a unique relationship with God because none of us are the same. God loves us each so differently and He loves us in the way we need to be loved. This is what our differences can and should be. Rather than being an opportunity for envy and conflict, our differences are to be an opening to the many expressions and vast richness of the love of Christ.

### Divine Mercy Sunday, April 16

On the Sunday after Easter, people all over the world will gather to celebrate the Feast of Divine Mercy. From St. Faustina's Diary, it is clear that this Octave Day of Easter is a day chosen by Christ as a day of extraordinary graces, a complete outpouring of His mercy upon all who approach Him with great trust and expectant faith. **Please Note:** There will be pamphlets available in church that explain the Divine Mercy Novena and Chaplet. These pamphlets are made available free of charge. The Knights of Columbus will lead the novena beginning on Good Friday, April 7, and will be prayed daily for nine days straight, ending the day before the Feast of Divine Mercy, April 15th. Please share them with family and friends.

### Next Sunday is Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

Because there are four gospels, there are four accounts of the passion of the Lord. John's account is proclaimed every year on Good Friday. Palm Sunday, the final Sunday of Lent, we hear one of the other three accounts. The vestments this day are red, just as they are on Good Friday. Most people call it Palm Sunday. It is a day for marching in processions. The gospel tells us that the people waved branches to welcome Jesus into Jerusalem. So today, we too wave branches. The 40 days of Lent have been a time to travel in spirit to the holy city of Jerusalem. Today, we enter the city. Any kind of branch can be used in the processions today. Olive branches are traditional because, ever since Noah's flood, they have been symbols of peace and forgiveness. In cooler climates, forsythia bushes, which are related to olives, come into bloom during this season. In most churches, palm branches are blessed and waved today. The Gospel of John mentions them specifically. In the Middle East, date palm trees grow in the incredible heat. In fact, they need several months of very high temperatures (100 degrees or more) to produce their sweet fruit. In warm climates people plant palms in cemeteries as a sign that life is stronger than death. For the same reason, people in northern countries plant pussy willows and evergreens. Then they cut branches from these plants for the Palm Sunday processions. In our country, most churches buy palms from florists. But there are places where people gather their own home-grown branches to bring to church. No matter where the palms and branches come from, they are all signs of life and resurrection. Next Sunday is the last Sunday before the Paschal Triduum, our Passover festival. The branches help us to welcome the Passover.

**Next Sunday, palms will be blessed and distributed at every weekend Mass. The blessings will occur at the beginning of the liturgies. Please try and be a little earlier than usual for the Palm Sunday liturgies.**

## LENTEN GUIDELINES

**ABSTINENCE:** Catholics in the U.S. age 14 and older are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. The Church law forbids use of meat, but does not prohibit eggs, milk products or condiments made with animal fat.

**PRAY/ALMSGIVING:** Abstinence and fasting should lead Catholics to a deeper prayer life. Almsgiving provides an opportunity for a deeper understanding and response to the needs of the poor.

### Jesus as Teacher The Full Circle

The fifth Sunday in Lent marks the end of the specifically “Lenten” spirit and feeling. After this, we get into Holy Week, which brings its own set of challenges. At a similar time in Jesus’ life and ministry, He summarized and wrapped up His message. He described the full circle of our life under God. He spoke in response to a scribe, a professional interpreter of the Jewish law, who asked Jesus which commandment was above all the rest. Jesus answered with words of Hebrew scripture: “There is one God above all and loving the God wholeheartedly is first and foremost,” but a second commandment is just as important: “Love your neighbor as yourself.” These words bring us full circle in a number of ways. They unite Jesus’ words with words of the old Jewish law, putting parts of our religious heritage together. But it does even more. It speaks to the full circle of God, self and neighbor. What, or who, is at the top of this circle? It might be tempting to put God there, but a circle can turn and roll, like a wheel. God is within the whole circle, as the source and spirit of love. Love is at the center of the circle and also on the periphery. The circle of love is a spirit quite different from the “survival of the fittest.” Love seeks the survival of the whole. It is not surprising that Jesus uses yeast as an example of His kingdom, something that makes the whole loaf rise. God’s love infuses all the rest. Contrary to legalists, God is not so much a judge or demander, as a source of life and self-giving. God is within us, as we share in our part of love’s circle, sharing with our neighbor, giving and receiving. God is within us as we feel ourselves challenged by new opportunities. We have a helpful coach, who supports us day by day and in the overall purpose of our life. We belong and our life has meaning. There is fullness of life in the circle of love.
