



Desk of Fr. Dan

With a change in the Mass schedule From the and reduction in Masses, there are many small details that always need to be ironed out. Liturgical minister schedules need to be modified, updates to our phone messages and website

need to be made, and a handful of people may find themselves asking the Goldilocks question: "Who's been sitting in MY seat?"

One of the big questions is: what will happen with extra Mass intentions? The answer in this case is rather simple. The intentions at the 4:30 PM Mass will move to the 4:00 PM Mass, the intentions at the 9:15 AM Mass will move to the 8:30 AM Mass, and the intentions at the 8:00 AM Mass will be added to the 10:30 AM Mass. "Doesn't that mean there will be two intentions at the one Mass?" you might ask. Yes, there will be. Before you think that is scandalous, allow me to try to explain how Mass intentions work.

The Mass is a participation in the Paschal Mystery - the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Paschal mystery is the source of all sacramental grace and is boundless. This means that every Mass carries with it a boundless amount of grace and any Mass can have any number of intentions. It is not as though you are only getting half of the grace because there is a second intention. It doesn't work like that. In fact, every Mass is always said with an intention of the salvation of souls. It is not a published intention, but it is an inherent part of the Mass.

While the Church recognizes this theologically, she also realizes the danger that this poses. If any Mass can carry any number of intentions and if public Mass intentions include an offering (the standard being \$10 in our diocese), a priest could make a great deal of money by "selling" more Mass intentions. This is clearly not what the Church intends. This is why Canon Law sets down the following rule: Canon 948: "Separate Masses are to be applied for the intentions of those for whom a single offering, although small, has been given and accepted." The trouble is, some communities have more intentions than they have Masses. Because there is boundless grace offered at each Mass, we do not want to refuse any offerings, especially those given for deceased members of our community. So, back when he was pastor, Msgr. Matusak received a special dispensation from the bishop that permits an additional intention for each Mass twice a week for each of our parishes – four per week in total. To this point, this has been done at our daily Masses. However, we are going to begin applying this dispensation on weekend Masses because of the Mass schedule change.

I hope this helps to explain why we are allowing more than one Mass intention for a single Mass. If anyone has an 8:00 AM intention and would like it to be moved to a different Mass time than 10:30, please let Linda know in the office. (In case you're wondering, the extra stipend does not go to the priest – it goes to the diocesan retired priest fund.)



To all parishioners of St. Pius X and Visitation Parishes

I am writing to inform you of the change in the Mass schedule for both of our parishes that will take effect beginning the first

weekend of July (July 1 and 2, 2023).

This request to change the Mass schedule was in consultation with Fr. Dan and our combined Parish Pastoral Council. Bishop Kulick accepted the recommendations and granted permission to change the Mass schedule of our parishes in Mt. Pleasant. The new Mass schedule which takes effect on the weekend of July 1st and 2nd, 2023 is as follows:

Saturday Vigil Mass:

- 4:00pm at Visitation Church
- 6:00pm at St. Pius X Church **Sunday Morning Mass:**
- 8:30am at Visitation Church
- 10:30am at St. Pius X Church

Weekday Mass remains the same at 7:00am.

This Mass schedule, Fr. Dan and I believe, addresses the needs of our parishes in a very prayerful, sound and accommodating way in fulfilling our Pastoral and Liturgical needs.

Please realize that the 4:30pm Vigil Mass at Visitation will be moved forward to 4:00pm and confessions will be heard at 3:15pm. Also, the Sunday 8:00am Mass at St. Pius X will be eliminated and the 9:15am Mass at Visitation will be moved forward to 8:30am.

Our schedule for Holy Days will remain the same at the present time in addition to the rotation for holidays, the Easter Triduum and Christmas Masses. These schedules, as always, will be published in the bulletin.

The Mass intentions that are already assigned to the 8:00am Masses have been eliminated and will be combined with the Mass intention for the 10:30am Mass at St. Pius X on those Sundays.

Thank you for your understanding and your graciousness in accepting the Mass schedule change. I believe this will truly serve the needs of the parishioners of St. Pius X and Visitation Parishes.



Thursday, June 29, is The Feast of the Apostles Saints Peter and Paul

In the fourth century on this day, Roman Christians would follow the bishop in procession as he celebrated the Liturgy first at the Church of St. Peter (which was built over the saints burial place) and then at the Church of St. Paul outside the Walls. Rome isn't the only city that celebrates this great day. Today's celebration is kept by all the Liturgical Churches all over the world. Eastern Churches even have a period of fasting to prepare for this feast. Peter and Paul came from thoroughly different backgrounds and had different gifts, but they had one great bond: both were called forth by Jesus' love. Jesus gave Peter his name - which means "rock" - at their first meeting. Jesus had chosen him to be the rock on which the new Church would be built. According to the Gospels, Peter often showed an understanding of Christ, but when Jesus was arrested and crucified, Peter denied Christ three times and hid in fear. When Jesus was risen from the dead, he told Peter, "Feed my lambs." Peter was recognized by the other disciples as their leader. He called the apostle to select a replacement for Judas. On Pentecost morning, he preached a bold sermon. He performed the first miracle of healing in the name of Jesus. In a dream, he came to understand that the Gospel message was for everyone on earth, not only the Jews like himself. Finally, he made his way to Rome, the center of the empire. Peter was probably imprisoned three or four times before being martyred around the year 64 during the persecutions of the emperor Nero. According to legend, he asked to be crucified upside down, since he did not feel worthy to die the same way Jesus died. Early in his life, Paul persecuted Christians with determination. But then he had a vision of Jesus, which left him with a complete change of heart. When Paul began preaching with Christ, the Christians naturally were afraid of him. But over the next 30 years, Paul was able to convince them of his sincerity. Paul was well equipped to be a missionary. He had a bright mind and a good education. He was familiar with the Scriptures because he had studied to be a Rabbi. Paul made four missionary journeys, crisscrossing the Mediterranean Sea. It's difficult to imagine what a challenge travel was in those days. Traveling by ship back then was something like traveling by space shuttle is today - it was expensive, dangerous and highly unusual. Paul was even shipwrecked. The exciting story is told in chapter 27 of the Acts of the Apostles. Where ever Paul went, he left behind small Christian communities. Paul preached to all classes of people. We know alot about the person Paul was from his letters to the various people and communities he cared about. Christian writings were written even before the Gospels. Like Peter, Paul was martyred by Nero, perhaps around the year 67. Unlike Peter, Paul was a Roman citizen. This gave him the right to a trial and, when he was convicted to a quick execution.



Sun - A Blessing from God:

During our hot summer days, our tempers become shorter, our patience becomes exhausted, our fuses burn out. We begin to argue, to bicker, to find fault, to nag, to complain - we begin to sin.

Admittedly, these are small sins, but the point is that the sun, a gift from God, can change this blessing into a malediction. Therefore, it is a good time now, for us to put into practice the other gifts that God has given us: **Patience** - to soothe the baby's cry or the old man's brow; **Consideration** - to keep cool during the heated outbreaks from our loved ones; **Love** - to hear some say "I'm hot" and be able to resist answering, "So am I." Let us remember, in our charity, to be patient, considerate and loving. Then, from God's bounty, we realize that, during a heat wave, we can absorb, besides the sun's heat, also God's love.

Sunday Mass. The ritual of the Mass calls for one dismissal. We have the following: prior to Communion, during Communion, after receiving Communion, and before the priest and ministers have exited. There are legitimate reasons for leaving Mass early, i.e., illness or emergency. By the number of people we have leaving early, we have an awful lot of emergencies or illnesses.

NOT!! If we can't spend an hour praising and thanking God on a weekly basis there is a need to re-evaluate our priorities. Think About It! Don't be in such a hurry to leave the celebration of the Eucharist early. Stay until the celebrant has exited. Thank you!
