

**From the
Desk of
Fr. Dan**

I urge you, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, your spiritual worship. – Romans 12:1

In the days of the Old Testament, animal sacrifice was offered in atonement for sins. An unfathomable number of resources was dedicated to this task, so essential it was to the life of the Jewish people. But when Jesus came and said that the temple would be destroyed and raised up in three days (John 2:19), He transferred the purpose and meaning of temple sacrifice to the sacrifice of His body on the cross. Because we are members of the body of Christ by our baptism, we share in that sacrifice and are called, as St. Paul says, to offer sacrifice with our bodies. This does not mean that we are to mimic the animal sacrifices of old. We do not burn our dead on an altar of offering to God. The Christian sacrifice is a different sort of sacrifice. It is a **living** sacrifice.

Our bodies often demand things of us that we know we should not do. Whether it's food cravings, tiredness, or impure desires, our bodies try to convince us that we can be happy by listening to its impulses. We know that this is not true, and yet in our weakness, we listen and fall for its lies again and again. Our bodily desires can have a strong hold over us. It is a great sacrifice to ignore the demands of the body. It is this sacrifice that St. Paul is calling Christians to make – to ignore the needs of the body when they conflict with the needs of the spirit and when they lead us away from God.

The Christian practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving help us to make that sacrifice regularly. Building up these good habits takes real intentionality and does not happen without sacrifice. But this is a sacrifice that is pleasing to the Lord – much more pleasing than the blood of animals.

The smoke of incense is a reminder of the sacrificial offerings made to God in the Old Testament – with one big difference. While the smoke of the Old Testament offerings on the altar was accompanied to the foul smell of burnt flesh, our incense used at the altar at Mass is accompanied with a more pleasant smell. This reflects the more pleasing sacrifices of the New Testament. And because our bodies are made into living sacrifices, they are a sort of altar, and at funeral Masses we incense the body of the deceased as a place of sacrifice to God. May our habits of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving make us truly worthy of that symbolic action by offering our bodies every day as a living sacrifice to God.

Presently, there are six Archconfraternity of Christian Mothers in the world. They are located in Paris, Rome, Regensburg (Ratisbon), Cracow, Einsiedeln, and Pittsburgh. The society founded its way to America on January 16, 1881 at St. Augustine's Church, now known as Our Lady of the Angels Parish, 220-37th St., Pittsburgh, PA. Our local parish membership meets the 3rd Thursday of the month in April, May, September-December. We share prayer, fellowship and support to our parish. 
Work To Begin Soon!

This Friday, September 8, is the Feast of the Birth of the Virgin Mary

No word of Mary's birth is recorded in scripture, so there's no way to know where or when it took place.

But it is fitting that we honor her birth in the harvest season, because Mary is the model for all who wish to bring forth Christ in their lives. In some parts of Europe, the summer harvest and the seed of the winter crops are blessed. For centuries, Catholic wine growers have used this day to bring the grape harvest to church to be blessed. Alpine farmers drive their cattle and sheep down from summer pastures on this day. Mary's birth was first kept by Byzantine Christians. By the seventh century, the Roman church began celebrating this feast, too. Like other feasts of Mary, it was a day for processions. We don't know who Mary's parents were. Tradition has named them Ann and Joachim (July 26). During the fifth century, a famous church named for St. Ann was dedicated in Jerusalem on September 8. The church was said to be built on the site of the house where Mary was born. The Immaculate Conception of Mary is celebrated on December 8 which is nine months before this day.

LABOR DAY

Labor Day marks the time when working people around the country come to the end of the summer vacation season and students return to school. We set aside this day to reflect on the work we do. Over the course of our lives, we spend more time working than we do any other activity. Until the last century or so, most people worked on farms. They worked long days and the pace of life was slower. The Industrial Revolution changed that. New farm machines meant that fewer farming jobs were available. Farm workers moved to the cities, where they took low paying jobs in factories. They worked as long as 16 hours a day. Their jobs were dangerous because the machinery had few safeguards against accidents. Even children as young as six or seven years old were forced to work because wages were so low and families needed many incomes to survive. The labor union movement was born in response to these conditions. Unions gave workers a way to stand together and fight for safe machinery, better salaries and fair treatment. The first official Labor Day was celebrated in New York City in 1882. Peter J. McGuire, founder of the carpenters' union, suggested Labor Day at a union meeting. In its early years, it was a day when workers called attention to their grievances. Eventually this day became a National Holiday. Now Labor Day is celebrated in Canada on the same day as in the United States. Many other countries observe a day to honor workers on May 1. Several Popes of the last hundred years have written encyclicals, which are teaching letters, to speak for the dignity and rights of workers. The American Bishops have also issued a letter about work. It's called *Economic Justice for All*.
