From the Desk of Fr. Dan

October is Respect Life month for us as Catholics, and we are called to be more attentive to pro-life issues in our world and in our community. As Catholics, we respect the dignity of human life from the moment of conception until natural death and work to protect that fundamental right

in our world. This is not an easy thing to do, as questions about the beginning and end of life are often very political in nature. And not only are we not supposed to talk about religion and politics, but the two subjects are not supposed to mix.


But we must be careful here. The word "politics" come from the Latin word *politicus* meaning "of citizens of the state". Saying that something is political means that it pertains to everyone under that governing body. Saying that we shouldn't talk about political (or religious) things amounts to saying that we shouldn't talk about anything that really matters. And isn't that how things seem? We talk often about the weather, sports and entertainment—things that don't really carry much weight. We rarely talk about the things that matter to us—the things that get us very emotionally charged.

I think this is a shame. If someone approaches me about an issue I take very personally and I am not used to talking about it seriously, I probably will get very emotional and not be able to talk about it reasonably. This means that I will never want to talk about it and never have an opportunity to change my mind about it if I am wrong. It also means that emotion carries more weight than reasoned thought, because I can't get beyond my emotions regarding a topic. Emotionally charged decisions are not typically better than reasonably informed ones.

The Catholic Church speaks out about life issues because it is about coming to a knowledge of the truth, even when it makes us emotional or uncomfortable. As a church, we do not identify with any political party. In the '60s, most Catholics were Democrats, whereas I think today, more are Republicans. But we ally with both parties on different issues-Democrats on immigration and the death penalty, and Republicans on abortion and freedom of religion, just to name a few. It is not that we preach and support one party over the other. We preach and support the truth. Period. When it seems that we as a religion get into politics more than we should, it's because the truth matters, and in many cases, lives and souls are at stake. Emotional banter is far too common in the political scene. We can and we must be a voice of reason that breaks into areas that are often emotionally charged but lacking in deep reflection and truth.

My hope is that regardless of your political affiliations and leanings, you will consider taking part in Respect Life month. Perhaps you can come with Bishop Kulick and me to the PA March for Life in Harrisburg on Monday, October 16. Notes from our Administrator, Fr. Paul:







Since 1973, the Catholic Church in the United States has observed October as "Respect Life Month". This year, Bishop Michael F. Burbidge of Arlington, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities invites Catholics to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Respect Life Month by embracing "radical solidarity" with women facing difficult or challenging pregnancies.

Bishop Burbidge echoes Saint John Paul II, who coined the term "radical solidarity" in reference to the care owed to vulnerable pregnant women: "In firmly rejecting 'pro-choice' it is necessary to become courageously 'pro-woman', promoting a choice that is truly in favor of women... The only honest stance, in these cases, is that of radical solidarity with the woman."

While our efforts must remain strong to end legalized abortion, Bishop Burbidge affirmed the personal responsibility of all Catholics to "thoroughly surround mothers in need with life-giving support and personal accompaniment."



THIS WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 4, IS THE FEAST DAY OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI. The church of Francis's day was wealthy and powerful, and most people sis not have the courage to take the words of the gospels literally. But Francis followed Christ's example. He became the "Poverella"-the "little poor one". He owned only one tunic, a plain brown robe with a rope for a belt, which was the garment worn by peasants when they labored in the fields. He worked with lepers, the most despised people of society. He acted as peacemaker between warring towns. Soon others began to join Francis, earning their bread by working in the field or by doing odd jobs. Francis had an understanding of the unity of all creation that was way ahead of its time. He addressed every created thing as a brother or sister and treated everything with reverence. He allowed the beauty of creation to fill him with joy.

Francis became ill and died when he was only 45 years old. On his deathbed he composed the Canticle of the Sun, a hymn of praise still sung to this day. Then he asked to be laid on Brother Earth naked so that he could welcome Sister Death as simply as possible. The pope who canonized him two years later described him as "the most perfect image of Christ". His body rests in the basilica that was built at Assisi after his death.

Francis of Assisi is a patron saint of Italy. In 1979, he was also named patron saint of ecologists and all people who work to protect the environment.

O Blessed Mother, at the angel's word you went in haste to the aid of your cousin Elizabeth. Although pregnant yourself, you placed her needs before your own.


