From the Desk of Fr. Dan Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.—Phil 4:8

It is so easy to be negative today. I talk to all kinds of people who think that we are in the end times—that things have gotten so bad that they are an indication of the terrible last things predicted in the book of Revelation. And maybe they are—I cannot say. The Lord told us that we will not know. This is to keep us humble but also to keep us vigilant—he may come tomorrow for all I know.

But I also think that we easily fall into this trap of thinking that things are so bad and so terrible because of the way we get news. Because of the developments of mass communication, news has become highly competitive. It used to be that you had two ways of getting news (aside from hearsay)—the newspaper and local television news. You had roughly 7 options. Today you have closer to 7,000 options. And they are all clamoring for our attention so they can compete. So, what grabs attention? Not good news. Bad news sells. Drama, sex, excitement, and terror grab attention. These things sell. So, we get these things in plenty.

Although our news cycle looks much different from in the days of St. Paul, I'm sure it was similar. There were those who made a living telling of the woes and terrors of their day. St. Paul is warning us that too much of this negativity is not good for us. Notice what he wants us to think about: things that are true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, gracious and excellent. These things are not exciting, but they are more important because they are of God.

When people come to confession and confess anger and frustration about the direction of our nation, our world, and society at large, I often advise them to limit how much news they are watching. It's important to be informed, but if we spend too much time absorbing news, we aren't spending enough time thinking about these things that are good to dwell on. I suggest setting down the news and picking up the Good News—the Bible. While the news is trying to convince us that the world is falling apart, we know the truth. We know that God is the master of time and space. We know that he claims the victory. Just a little time with Scripture and in prayer each day helps us to think about these good things more and to be filled with more hope as we go through our lives.

Notes from our Administrator, Ir. Paul:

IT'S TIME IN OUR LIVES TO RESPECT LIFE

Once, most people saw life as God's greatest gift. Children were seen as blessings. Life was respected no matter how old or disabled or weak. Our own country was founded on the belief that the right to life is sacred and inviolable.

But, over the past several decades, we have lost our way. So much so that acts once treated as crimes are considered "right". We have slipped, often without realizing it, into what Pope St. John Paul II called a culture of death. As individuals, and as a nation, we should ask ourselves: How are we treating God's gift of life? Do we treat human life with the reverence it deserves? It is only with human beings that God shares something of Himself. And among all His creatures, humans are able to know and love Him, and by their own free will choose to become more god-like. What other creatures yearn for truth, justice, beauty and love, and for God, their source?

We can help people understand that statesanctioned killing is unworthy of God's creatures, that there are other ways to protect society from those who have done great harm. Women tempted by abortion need to know they are not alone, and that help is available for pregnancy needs, adoption and baby supplies. We need to be with those suffering from a terminal illness and their families, offering help, friendship and encouragement, never abandoning them.

We can, by hard work and with God's help, transform our culture into one of respect for life. It must begin in each of our hearts, with reverence for every single human life God has called into existence. We must care for others because God has made us responsible for them—the child not yet born, the dying woman, even the justly convicted killer. No human life should be outside our concern, because none is beyond the reach of God's love.

I share this sad news with our parishes:

SISTER M. CARMELITA MIELE, SC, age 90, entered eternal life at Caritas Christi, the motherhouse of the Sisters of Charity of Seton Hill, Greensburg, on September 21, 2023 in the 68th year of religious life. She entered the congregation of the Sisters of Charity on January 1, 1955, from Saint Pius X parish in Mount Pleasant. In her pastor's recommendation, he wrote, "She will find her greatest happiness only in the sisterhood."

She is preceded in death by her parents, Joseph A. and Mary (Maliandi) Miele; a brother, Felix; and a sister, Catherine Shutty. She is survived by two brothers, Joseph and Jerry; the Miele families; and her religious community.

Sister Carmelita earned a bachelor's degree in education from Seton Hill University preparing her for thirty-four years of teaching at the elementary level in the Dioceses of Pittsburgh, Greensburg, Washington, D.C., and Tucson, AZ. She earned a Certificate of Religious Studies through a threeyear summer program at Seton Hill University which led her to ministries as Director of Faith Formation and Parish Minister

Sister had a great zeal for the less fortunate. Her interest was nurtured during her first assignment at the House of Mary in Pittsburgh's Hill District. Phrases like "Option for the Poor" and "Dignity of Each Person" took on a new meaning. She said it was there she "learned that it was never enough to feed only the body or provide clothing or shelter. It was most important to nourish the soul and to provide hope." She experienced similar meanings when she participated in the Intercultural Mission Exchange Program between the Sisters of Charity of Seton Hill and the Sisters of the Holy Family, New Orleans.

In 2004, Senator Joe Minard (WV) presented Sister Carmelita a Proclamation in recognition of her 50th jubilee, retirement, and countless accomplishments during her ministry in West Virginia. She was proclaimed an official member of the Order of the thirty-fifth Star of the State of West Virginia for her distinguished and committed service in her position as Director of Religious Education at Immaculate Conception Parish in Clarksburg, WV. She was also presented a Proclamation on behalf of the Mayor and the Citizens of Clarksburg on "Sister Carmelita Day," in recognition of fourteen years of labors of love, visitation, teaching youth and adults, and ministry.

When she retired at Caritas Christi, Sister immediately began to volunteer on the Pastoral Care Team at Jeannette District Memorial Hospital until it closed, and the St. Vincent de Paul Store, Greensburg for ten years. She continued her active volunteer ministry at the Adult Day Care Center located in the Monahan Center at Caritas Christi. The Sisters of Charity are grateful for the faithful and caring nursing staff and employees who ministered to Sister Carmelita during her final years the way she did to so many.

In reflecting on her life as a Sister of Charity, Sister Carmelita said, "The call to live the religious life is God's gift and I am deeply grateful. Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton's counsel to her sisters, 'to be children of the church,' has led me to know and understand that we are always in the company of the apostles in carrying out the mission of Jesus in the church."







