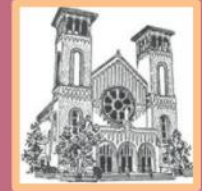

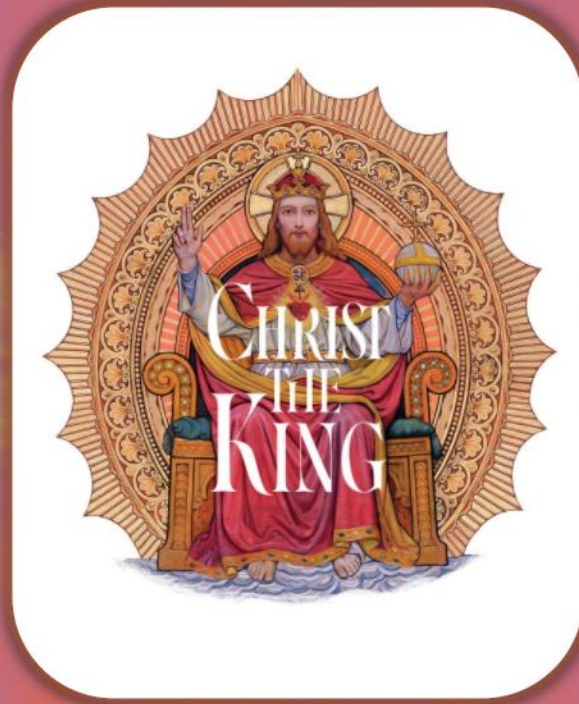

The lost I will seek out, the strayed I will bring back, the injured I will bind up, the sick I will heal, but the sleek and the strong I will destroy, shepherding them rightly. – Ezekiel 34:16

When we think of the Good Shepherd, I imagine that most of us think about Psalm 23. In that psalm, we hear about how the Lord is our Shepherd who will lead us to flowing waters and green, verdant pastures. It sounds wonderful.

Then it tells us, your rod and your staff comfort me. How are the rod and staff a comfort? Let's start with the meaning of the staff. We often think of shepherds and sheep being out in green fields, but in Israel, shepherds had their flocks out in the desert. The weather was blazing hot. So, they took the sheep out to pasture during the night when it was still dark and not as hot. The shepherd would lead his flocks through the dark night by tapping his staff on the rocky ground. Even though it was difficult for the sheep to see, they could follow the shepherd by hearing the tapping sounds of the staff. The staff was also used as a weapon to defend the flock against predators.

If the staff was used to guide and protect, the rod served a very different purpose. It was used to smack animals who were misbehaving. The sheep who were wandering off or getting off course got a chastisement from the rod to usher them back onto the right path.

God shepherds us rightly using both a rod and a staff. Sometimes, he can be gentle – tapping the ground with the staff and encouraging us to follow Him. At other times, he is not so gentle. He needs to yank us back on course when he wishes to take us somewhere we do not want to go. Every parent of children has been here. It's much more pleasant to guide with a staff. No one wants to use the figurative rod – chastising or punishing people we love is not fun. But it is a necessary tool over the course of our lifetime.

This should bring us comfort, as the psalmist says. If the shepherd doesn't nudge us in the right direction, we could end up wandering around in the dark and falling off a cliff. The Shepherd, in using the rod, is keeping us from the danger of falling off course and getting totally lost.

We always want our Shepherd to bind up our injuries and heal us when we're sick. But if we're getting too big for our britches, think we know better than God, and start to go our own way, He will use the rod. If in your relationship with God or in your prayer God never tells you "No", it's possible that you're missing something crucial. We are not allowing him to shepherd us if we ignore anything and everything that challenges us and chastises us. We should be grateful for the rod and comforted by it, even though it's not always pleasant.

TODAY, NOVEMBER 26, we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. This was instituted by Pope Pius XI and was celebrated on the last Sunday in October to foster awareness of Christ's dominion over all people and to establish peace among nations. After Vatican Council II, the feast was transferred to the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year, the Sunday before Advent. This feast celebrates Christ's Kingship in an altogether non-worldly way. Jesus was anointed by the Father with the oil of gladness as the Eternal Priest and Universal King. As Priest, He offered His life on the altar of the cross and redeemed the human race by this one perfect sacrifice of peace. As King, He claims dominion over all creation, that He may present to the almighty Father, a Kingdom of truth and life, a Kingdom of holiness and grace, a Kingdom of justice, love and peace. May we present ourselves to Christ, our King as we prepare for the upcoming new liturgical year as an example to our families and friends of what it means to have Christ as the center of our daily lives.

ADVENT, which begins next Sunday, is a season in which you and I prepare our hearts for the coming of the Christ Child. Hopefully, this translates into a generosity to Christ and His Church. As we enter the Advent season, hopefully we are making plans not only to decorate our homes but also our hearts early. This can be accomplished by using the four weeks of Advent this year to prepare for the birth of our Savior. Please make an attempt to add prayers and works of charity and kind words and a cheery disposition to all that you do in this upcoming Advent season. We will then have a special gift to present to the Christ child on Christmas.

DECEMBER 8 is the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Our Blessed Mother, which is a holy day of obligation. All Catholics are obliged to attend Mass on that day. Our Mass schedule for the Immaculate Conception is as follows: **THURSDAY**, Dec. 7, 6 p.m. at Visitation; **FRIDAY**, Dec. 8, 7 a.m. at Visitation; 6 p.m. at St. Pius X.

THIS WEEKEND is the beginning of hunting season. As some of our parishioners begin a sojourn into the fields and forests of the region, we pray for their safety and entrust them to the patron saint of hunters, St. Hubert. "God called St. Hubert from a worldly life to his service in an extraordinary manner: though the circumstances of this event are so obscured by popular inconsistent relations that we have no authentic account of his actions before he was engaged

in the service of the church under the discipline of St. Lambert, Bishop of Maestricht." The "extraordinary manner" referred to in Alban Butler's commendably guarded statement is related to have been as follows: Hubert was very fond of hunting and one Good Friday went out after a stag when everybody else was going to church. In a clearing of the woods, the beast turned, displaying a crucifix between his antlers. Hubert stopped in astonishment, and a voice came from the stag, saying, "Unless you turn to the Lord, Hubert, you shall fall into Hell." He cast himself on his knees, asking what he should do, and the voice told him to seek out Lambert, the bishop of Maestricht, who would guide him.

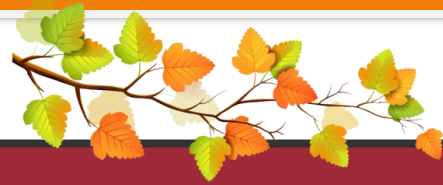
However the retirement of Hubert from the world came about, he entered the service of St. Lambert and was ordained a priest. When the bishop was murdered at Liege about the year 705, Hubert was selected to govern the See in his place. Some years later, he transported Lambert's bones from Maestricht to Liege, then only a village upon the banks of the Meuse, which from this grew into a flourishing city. In those days, the forest of Ardenne stretched from the Meuse to the Rhine and in several parts, the gospel of Christ had not yet taken root. St. Hubert penetrated into the most remote places of the this country and abolished the worship of idols. The author of his life relates as an eyewitness that on the rogation days the holy bishop went out of Maestricht in procession through the fields and villages, with his clergy and people according to custom, following the cross and the relics of the saints, and singing the litany. This procession was disturbed by a woman possessed by an evil spirit; but St. Hubert silenced her and restored her to health by signing her with the cross. Before his death, he is said to have been warned of it in a vision and given as it were a sight of the place prepared for him in glory. Twelve months later, he went into Barbant to consecrate a new church. He was taken ill immediately after at Tervueran, near Brussels. On the sixth day of his sickness he quietly died, on May 30, in 727.

May St. Hubert guide and protect the hunters of our parishes during this hunting season and always.
