From the Desk of Fr. Dan

One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. – Mark 1:7

Although we don't wear sandals as often as people did in Jesus' day, I think this statement makes a lot of

sense to us. Loosening the thongs of one's sandals means removing them. People wore sandals in the region because it was hot and sandy. Normally when entering a house (if the person was well off enough), a slave would come and wash the guest's feet, taking their sandals off to do it. This is what makes Jesus' gesture of washing the feet of His disciples at the Last Supper so striking and why Peter says, "You will never wash my feet."

While this passage seems to speak of John the Baptist's humility and recognition about not being the foretold Christ, there is something more going on here with this language. In the book of Deuteronomy, this phrase is used in an unexpected way. In Deuteronomy 25, a law is given about what is called a Levirate marriage. A Levirate marriage was what happened when someone's brother died without any children. It was the responsibility of the oldest surviving male to take his brother's wife as his own and have children with her for his brother's sake. While this seems really messed up to us today, men could have many wives in those days and the Jewish people did not originally believe in the resurrection. If your only way of living past death was through descendants, this was how someone's brother helped them to live on after a premature death.

The law in Deuteronomy says that a brother could refuse to take up this duty of marrying the widow of his brother. If so, this would happen: *If he persists in saying, "I do not want to marry her," his sister-in-law, in the presence of the elders, shall go up to him and strip his sandal from his foot and spit in his face, declaring, "This is how one should be treated who will not build up his brother's family!" And his name shall be called in Israel, "the house of the man stripped of his sandal."*

After this, the wife is then free to marry the next-older brother (or someone else if there are no other brothers). The removal of someone's sandal means taking away his right to be the bridegroom of the widow. John the Baptist is using this phrase not merely to describe humility and lowering of himself compared to Jesus. He is making a point that we're talking about a marriage here. Jesus comes to be the Bridegroom of the Church. And for John the Baptist, taking up that mantle is an impossibility. He is not worthy to be the bridegroom – only Christ can be that.

Jesus' love for his people is like that of a groom for his bride or a husband for his wife. Do we appreciate that kind of love that God has for us? And do we love Him in the same way in return?



Notes from our Administrator, Fr. Paul:

SOMETHING NEW: "A NEW SPIRIT"

Life is lived on many levels. Almost everyone has times when they feel "at the bottom of the heap". But also times when we feel "on top of the world". In between, we vary between discouragement and hope, optimism and depression. Since we all have "down" times, what does faith offer to help us get "up"?

First of all, we need to take stock of where we are. This is what Advent is for. Christmas usually is an "up" time, but how do we get there? We do well to take off both the blinders and the rose-colored glasses. We may not have some dire thing wrong that we need to corfess or a major fault that we need to correct. But most of us carry some burdens that weigh us down. A health problem may diminish our energy. A difficult family member or business associate may keep us from feeling that we can never relax. It helps to identify what hinders us.

Second, we can gain help by asking ourselves, "Can I do something about the burden I am carrying? Are there things that I can change?" Take a fresh look! Is there some new approach and remedy to try? If nothing still seems able to solve the problem, can we find a new way to cope with it, live with it? Sometimes, simply finding something else creative to do gives us new perspective. Endure what we can. For the rest, find someone to talk with. Sharing your feelings helps to make the burden lighter.

Third, remember that God is near and can be called on. Pray with the Psalmist, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me." The Psalms deal with the many levels of our living in remarkable ways. Reading them can provide a background that makes our praying more effective.

Finally, remember that God came to earth to live out, in Christ, a life that was victorious despite all its complications and burdens. Through Him, our own spirits may be renewed. All of these can be accomplished by making a good confession during this Advent season. Please see the list of regional Penance services in this bulletin.

THE FEAST OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

Every year pilgrims stream to a great church near Mexico City. There, over the altar, is a simple tilma (a cloak) made from two pieces of cactus cloth. Though that kind of cloth seldom lasts 20 years, this tilma has survived intact for centuries.

In 1531, the tilma belonged to Juan Diego, an Aztec Indian. Juan had been baptized a Christian after the Spanish invaded Mexico. One December morning he was walking past an old shrine of the Aztec goddess of the corn harvest. The Spanish had smashed

the shrine and renamed the place Guadalupe. There Juan saw a vision of Mary, the mother of God. She was dressed as an Aztec princess. She had olive skin and black hair like an Aztec. She was clothed in magnificent colors. Around her waist was a sash, which women wore when they were pregnant.

Mary spoke to Juan with affection. She gave him a message for the local bishop. Mary wanted the bishop to build a church where she stood. She promised to grant help to all who called on her there. When Juan Diego delivered the message, the bishop didn't believe him. Mary provided Juan with a sign to take to the bishop. She guided Juan to a spot where wild roses were blooming. He was amazed to see roses in winter.

Juan Diego gathered an armful of flowers into his cloak and hurried off to show them to the bishop. But when he opened his tilma in the bishop's house, an even more amazing sign had been provided. Somehow the image of Mary, just as she looked when she appeared to Juan, filled the tilma.

The Mother of God brought this bright message, one of hope and compassion. She is honored throughout the Americas and all over the world.
