

From the Desk of Fr. Dan In our first reading this weekend, we hear about Jonah being called by God to go to Nineveh to preach a message of repentance. What we often miss in this story is how ridiculous this request that God makes is. First, Jonah was a terrible prophet. He did not want to go. He ended up in the bel-

ly of a whale for three days because he would not listen. There certainly could have been better options to send.

Second, Ninevah was not friendly with God's chosen people. Nineveh was the capital of the Assyrian empire, and the Assyrians were the ones who conquered the Northern Kingdom in 721 BC. They were enemies of Judah and the city's destruction was prophesied (Nahum 1:1-14, Zephaniah 2:13-15).

Third, there was little to no hope that this message of repentance would do anything. The city had been prophesied by God already to be destroyed. And even though God was seeming to give it one final chance through Jonah's preaching, it was a pagan city with no Jewish roots. The nation was strong and flourishing. Why would the people have any reason to listen to this Jewish prophet's message, especially when he himself was not that impressive?

The story ends unexpectedly. The people listen to Jonah and repent by fasting, putting on sackcloth and ashes, and praying. And God listens to them and delivers them from the destruction he foretold.

This story reminds us of the power of God. Even though Jonah was a terrible prophet and even though Ninevah was enemies with Judah and were not likely to be open to this message, Jonah did it will little hope that it would work. (In fact, we learn later that Jonah is angry that God forgives them.)

The point of the story is that anything is possible with God. We can often question whether something God wants us to do is worthwhile. In our eyes, it's a waste of time and probably won't have any effect. But we don't know how God might make use of it to transform us.

So, the lesson of this story is to be open to the Lord and willing to do what He asks you to do. You may not understand how it will make any sense, but when we submit our will to God's, marvelous, impossible things can take place.

THIS FRIDAY,
JANUARY 25, IS
THE FEAST OF
THE CONVERSION
OF ST. PAUL. The
ninth chapter of the
Acts of the
Apostles tells the
story of Paul's
conversion to

Christ. The story is so important that Luke includes it two other times in the Acts of the Apostles, and Paul tells the story in his own words in the first chapter of his Letter to the Galatians.

Before he became known as Paul, his name was Saul. He was a tentmaker from the city of Tarsus. Saul had studied to become a teacher. When Stephen (December 26), the first Christian martyr, was killed, Saul held the coats of those who threw the stones. Saul set out for Damascus. He wanted to arrest any Christians who had escaped from Jerusalem after Stephen's death. Along the way, Saul was struck down to the ground and blinded. He heard the voice of Jesus. Jesus asked him, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?"

Saul was in shock. He allowed himself to be led to the home of Christians in Damascus. A holy man named Ananias prayed with him and his sight was restored. Saul went to an isolated spot to reflect on his new faith. Then he returned to Damascus and began preaching the gospel. Everyone was astounded at the change in him. Now Saul was the one being persecuted. His friends feared for his life. They helped him to escape from Damascus by lowering him over the wall of the city in a basket. Saul, who began to call himself by the Roman name of Paul, went out on missionary journeys. He crossed the Roman empire four times to bring the good news of Christ to the world.

IN THE NEXT FEW WEEKS, we will be celebrating the Feast of St. Blaise, February 3, with the Blessing of Throats and beginning the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday, February 14. We are now in the midst of preparation for these Liturgical feasts and seasons. We are changing the schedules and devotions a little this year. I ask that you pay attention to the announcements in the forthcoming bulletins. We are also in the process of making plans and preparing food for our Lenten fish fry at St. Pius X. We need help staffing these dinners on Fridays, and of course, we need customers! Thank you for your consideration.

MISSING SUNDAY MASS By our Baptism, we offer faithfulness to the Lord and the family in thanksgiving for God's gift of being faithful to us. Our faithfulness as family is more noticeably expressed by the weekly gathering of that family at Mass. It is a reunion of God and His people. Deep down we know we should be there; otherwise, the family is incomplete. When we miss Mass willfully by idleness or neglect, we are breaking our promise. But, when we have to miss Mass because of ill health. extreme weather or another good reason which prevents us, we do not break our promise. We do not sin. We may feel disappointed, even somewhat empty, but we needn't feel guilty. In fact, the disappointment shows that we really wanted to be at Mass. That's a blessed feeling, not a sinful one. So, whenever you wonder about having missed Mass, you can judge your intention by asking: Did I really want to be with the family?

THIS SATURDAY, JANUARY 27, IS THE FEAST DAY OF ST. ANGELA MERICI (Religious founder c.1474-1540) Angela Merici was born in Descenzano, Italy. She spent much of her early life grieving. By the time she reached her twenties, she had lost the five people closest to her. Her parents, her favorite sister, the uncle who raised her and her best friend had all died. She could have spent her life in sorrow. But Angela saw that there was great need all around her. In filling that need, she found new joy and hope. Angela especially noticed the needs of the poor children of her town. Four friends came to live with her, and they began to teach religion to young girls. The work went well. Angela designed a training program for teachers. Soon she was asked to begin a school in the city of Brescia. She also gave spiritual encouragement to a group of men and women there. They provided funds for the school. In 1525, the Pope tried to convince Angela to take charge of a congregation of nursing sisters, which was a job with great honor. But she didn't want so much fame. Even more important, she sensed that her true mission was to teach.

In time, Angela gathered a group of young women. Some of them lived in community, but many others lived at home with their families. They wore simple clothing, prayed and studied together, and devoted their lives to teaching. They called themselves the Ursulines. They were to become the first teaching order of religious women. They chose Angela as the head of the group. She held that position for the last five years of her life. The Ursulines flourish to this day and still have as their mission the education of young women.

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
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



