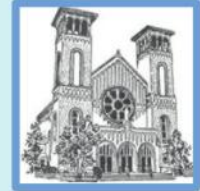

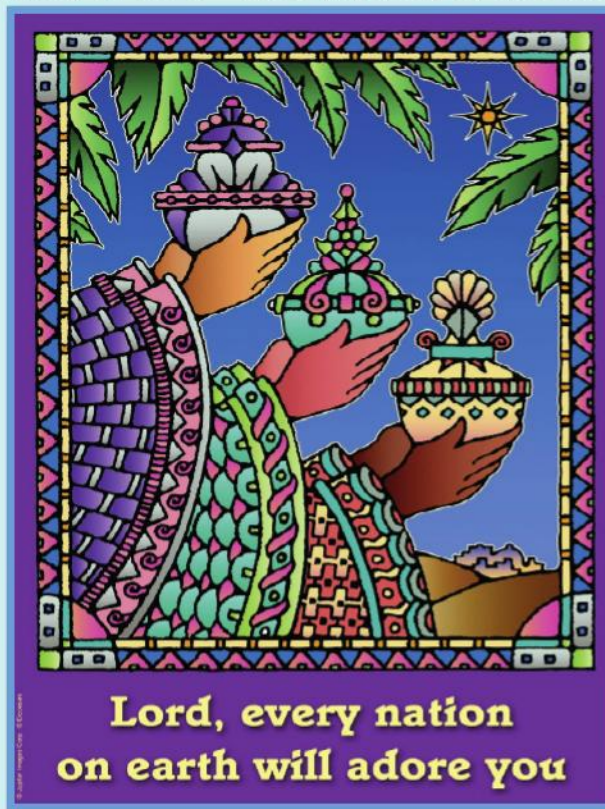

the Desk
of
Fr. Dan*

One of the most popular contemporary understandings of God in our world today is one that sees God as an all-encompassing spirit who is in all things and connects all people together. This spiritual being is not connected to any one religion but is present in all religions. This theology fits in quite nicely with our secular and pluralistic culture. With this idea of God, we can appreciate all faith beliefs and backgrounds, because they all equally participate in God.

As nice as this sort of understanding of God is, there is one glaring problem: it does not correspond with our experience of love. One could say that the first step of love is in recognizing the presence of our parents – their faces, their voices, their smells, and their embraces. Soon after comes knowing their name, which is why so often the first words of a child are “Mama” or “Dada”.

This is where the all-encompassing spirit idea seems to fall apart. If we believe that God is love and that He loves us each personally, how can we believe that He would not want us to know His name or to hear His voice?

The profound, loving act of God revealing Himself to His people is what we celebrate on this feast of the Epiphany. God desires that all His children should come to know Him – in every time and place. This is why He reveals Himself to us in many ways – including His Word in the Scriptures. But the most powerful way we know God is through Jesus. This is the truest and fullest Epiphany of God.

Three biblical events traditionally belong to the Epiphany as a part of God revealing Himself in Christ. The first is the three wise men arriving at the humble stable – the moment when God reveals His face to the whole world. The second is Jesus’ baptism – the moment when the Spirit comes down on Jesus and we hear the Father’s voice saying “This is my beloved Son.” The third is the wedding feast at Cana, where Jesus performed his first miracle by turning the water into wine and began his earthly ministry. All three of these events show how God reveals Himself to us definitively, as we would expect a parent to do with a child. It is the greatest example of God’s love for us that He chooses to share His Son with us and join us to His family.

Jesus came to be with us, to live among us, to speak with us. He longs for a true personal, loving relationship with us. And He invites all of us as brothers and sisters to be baptized into this family of love where we can come to know Him more and more each day.

*Notes from our Administrator,
Fr. Paul:*

TODAY, WE CELEBRATE THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD. This feast is an important event in Christ’s life which brought about a change in the world which affects our lives today. It’s hard to talk about Epiphany without sounding like we’re exaggerating. Today is a day of superlatives. Epiphany is the grandest, merriest, brightest and best day of Christmastime.

According to legend, the Wise Men were considered royal personages. The names were traditionally given as Melchior, Caspar and Balthasar. Melchior was supposedly an old man with long hair and a white beard. His gift of gold was said to be testimony to the royalty of Christ. Caspar is usually pictured young and beardless. Tradition says his gift of incense was a token of Christ’s divine nature. Balthasar is pictured with a black complexion and a full beard. The myrrh he held is said to have prefigured the death of Christ. Epiphany means “appearance” and “revelation” and “manifestation”. In the Gospel stories of Epiphany, we hear that God appears in creation. God is revealed in a star, in the waters of the river, in the shining skies, on the wings of a dove, in stone jars of everyday water.

In many families, a famous Epiphany tradition is to have a party in honor of the visit of the Magi. A special cake in which a bean or coin has been hidden is served. The lucky person who finds this object in his or her slice of cake is crowned king or queen for the evening! This person leads everyone in the dancing procession that tops off the fun.

The head of the house has two major responsibilities. One is to host the Carnival Party before Lent begins. The other is to lead the blessing of the home for the New Year. The numerals of the year are written with chalk over the front door. The initials of the legendary names of the Magi are added—Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. The home is dedicated to hospitality.

In a sense, at Epiphany all of us are queens and kings. In Baptism, we were anointed to be God’s royal people. Now the star shines over us, we who are baptized, we who bear the name of Christ.

NEW YEAR, NEW BEGINNINGS

Mary's example is a good one to emulate as we begin a new year. This is an opportunity to reflect on the past—the good and the bad—and use those insights to help us shape the future. In other words, we can use our New Year's Resolutions to help us grow closer to God. What can we do to make our lives better reflect God's vision for us? Try these tips to make your spiritual goals “stick” this year: Be specific. Nebulous goals, like “grow closer to God” are next to impossible to fulfill.

Break them down into specific pieces; specific goals are, by definition, measurable! Being able to gauge your progress helps you stay motivated. Be realistic. If you overreach, you're likely to burn out. Call for help when the going gets tough!

TOMORROW, MONDAY, JANUARY 8, we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.



When Advent began we heard the words of Isaiah: “O that you would tear open the heavens and come down!” Jesus goes into the Jordan River to be baptized by John. Suddenly the skies open. God’s spirit comes down in the form of a dove. Then, God speaks for everyone to hear: “This is my Beloved.” In the fifth century, Bishop Maximus of Turin wrote that we have every reason to celebrate this day with the joy of Christmas: “At Jesus’ birth, His Mother, Mary, held her child close to her heart. So, the Father holds his beloved Son for all people to adore. Jesus is baptized so all Christians may follow Him with confidence.”

In Hebrew, the name of Jesus is Joshua. This name means Savior. A thousand years before the time of Jesus, in the days of the Exodus, after Moses died, a man named Joshua became the leader of the Hebrew people. Joshua led the people through the Jordan River and into the Promised Land.

Our Savior Jesus is a new Joshua. Jesus leads us into the Jordan of Baptism. We pass through the water to enter a new life. Sweetened dairy foods such as cheesecake and eggnog are customary during Christmastime in honor of our Savior, who leads us into “a land flowing with milk and honey.”

All lectors, Eucharistic ministers and altar servers are able to volunteer to cover a position for which you have not been scheduled, if you happen to attend a Mass when this happens. Know that all the guidelines are the same for each Mass so that you are able to feel at home whenever you come and can help when all the ministries are not covered for a Mass. In this way, we show that we are faithful and are members of these parishes. Fr. Paul thanks you for helping to create a good liturgy.

Gather with family members, friends, and perhaps
some neighbors at the front door.*

Leader: In the (+) name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Let us pray: *Christus mansionem benedicat.* May Christ bless this house, Amen.

With chalk we sign this doorway, along with four crosses of the seasons and the numerals of the new year. [20+C+M+B+24]

Leader: A reading from the Letter to the Galatians. So then, while there is time, let us do good for all people, especially those who are the household of faith. The Word of the Lord.

Each room is sprinkled with holy water.

Living room: Bring us to live with you one day in heaven. Bless this room, O Lord. Amen.

Kitchen: You prepare for us a heavenly banquet. Bless this room, O Lord. Amen.

Dining room: Feed us at your celestial feast. Bless this room, O Lord. Amen.

Bedrooms: In you alone we rest peacefully. Bless this room, O Lord. Amen.

Bathroom: Cleanse us from all uncleanness. Bless this room, O Lord. Amen.

All return to the front door to pray the Our Father together. All are sprinkled with holy water. Bless this household through all days to come, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, forever and ever. Amen.



SEVEN WAYS TO KICKSTART YOUR SPIRITUAL LIFE IN 2024

1. **SPIRITUAL DIRECTION.** If you've never considered spiritual direction before, make this the year.
2. **DAILY QUIET.** In the digital age, every waking moment is filled with stimulation. Take ten minutes a day, or even five, to "be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10).
3. **ATTEND WEEKDAY MASS ONCE A WEEK.** The crazier life is, the more important that brief respite from the things of the world becomes.
4. **CELEBRATE THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION MORE FREQUENTLY.** For many, communal penance services offered during Lent and Advent are less than satisfying. Instead, make time to go to the weekly confession times in your local parish.
5. **GET INVOLVED IN YOUR PARISH.** If you already volunteer, examine your commitments to be sure you are making the best use of your time and unique gifts.
6. **EXPLORE A TEACHING OF THE CHURCH THAT IS DIFFICULT FOR YOU TO ACCEPT.** Approach the topic with a mind willing to learn and a heart willing to hear the voice of God. Study the catechism or papal writings, and don't be afraid to be honest with God in prayer.
7. **SET ASIDE SUNDAY AS A TRUE DAY OF REST.** Stay off work e-mail. Minimize shopping, lest Sunday becomes "errand day." The Sabbath was made for us (Mark 2:27) because we need it. Use it!
