Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a burnt offering. -Genesis 22:2

You shall not worship the Lord, your God, that way, because they offered to

their gods every abomination that the Lord detests, even burning their sons and daughters to their gods. – Deuteronomy 12:31

Many people are disturbed by the story of Abraham and Isaac. Taken out of context, someone might truly believe that the moral of this story is, "If God asks me to kill someone, I should do it. Because I must obey God."

While it's true that we should obey God, some context for this story can help us better understand it. In those days, the prevailing pagan attitude was that the gods demand sacrifices, and the most pleasing sacrifice is sacrifice of human blood. So, human sacrifice was common. And if you didn't offer it, you might have been seen as a people who were less devoted to your god.

In many places of the Torah (the law given to Moses), including the above passage from Deuteronomy, human sacrifice was forbidden. In place of human sacrifice, Israel offered animal sacrifice. You can imagine the contempt other nations would have at this practice. "You don't really love your god. You won't even offer your own children as sacrifices to him." The story of Abraham explains why this is. Abraham was willing to offer his only son to God. But God stayed Abraham's hand. This story makes sense of why Israel was still just as devoted to their God as everyone else despite not offering human sacrifice to him like the pagans around them. It also makes sense of why we should always obey God—He would never ask us to do something that would be harmful to us or others.

Another lesson we can learn from this story is that we should not compare sacrifices with one another. Lent is not about offering a "bigger" sacrifice or a "better" sacrifice. It's about offering the right sacrifice—one that is pleasing to God.

Lastly, although God forbade Abraham from offering Isaac and instead gave him an animal to sacrifice, He did not do that with Jesus. He offered His own Son as a sacrifice on the cross and did not rescue him at the last minute. The crucifixion of Jesus is the fulfillment of the sacrifice of Isaac. When Lent gets tough for us, remember that God would never ask us to sacrifice anything more than what he has already done for us in Christ. Notes from our Administrator, Fr. Paul:

THE UNFOLDING MESSAGE: LEARNING WHO GOD IS

What can help us to know and appreciate the One, who undergirds our life? The gospel of John helps us with this. As we try to contemplate who God is and what God can provide for our lives, we hear the words, "No one has ever seen God; it is God, the only Son, ever at the Father's side, who has revealed Him." These cryptic words, somewhat confusing to our modern ears, contain an eternal truth. We see God most clearly in and through Jesus Christ. In other words, as we see, living and speaking in certain ways and revealing a sense of God's presence, we come to realize what God makes available to us. We humans cannot fully fathom the infinite. We cannot encapsulate God. In Jesus, though, we gain the knowledge of God that is essential for sensing God's presence and guidance within our lives.

"God was in Christ." These words of scripture should be the background for all our attempts to live out our divine calling. Like Jesus, God is personal and near, living in our midst. God is our standard for righteousness, what is good and right, what is true and wise. Jesus' attitude and actions show what this means in specific, lived-out ways. God is a loving, healing force in our midst, just as Jesus again and again showed healing compassion and affection. He was understanding and caring. He brought wholeness and renewal of life. Where some of the prophets proclaimed God's judgment, Jesus does affirm what is right and true, but more as a guide and standard than a condemnation. Jesus' self-giving revealed God's caring and love. These illustrate how His unfolding message helps us to grasp who and what God is.

The season of Lent challenges us to pause and take time to know God better. As Jesus at times moved away from the crowds, can we move away from our crowded agenda, our busyness, our pursuit of physical and financial well-being long enough to sense the highest values that are God-centered and that Jesus calls us to?

STATIONS OF THE CROSS is a popular devotion in honor of the Passion and Death of Christ. It consists of meditating on 14 "stations" or "stages" in the Passion of Christ and will be offered for the week at Visitation at 12:05 p.m. and at St. Pius X at 6 p.m. on FRIDAY, MARCH 1. Please note, we would appreciate women volunteers to lead this week, as we'll feature a Marian version of Stations. Ladies, if you cannot help this time, please consider assisting on March 22. Thank you for taking time to put Jesus first!

LENTEN GUIDELINES

ABSTINENCE: Catholics in the U.S. age 14 and older are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. The church law

forbids use of meat, but does not prohibit eggs, milk products or condiments made with animal fat. **FASTING:** Catholics in the U.S. from the day after their 18th birthday until the day after their 59th birthday, are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday. The church law allows for only one full meal a day, but does not prohibit the taking of some food in the morning and evening. The combined quantity of the two meals should not exceed the quantity eaten at the full meal. The drinking of ordinary liquids does not break the fast. Note: Persons taking medication or with health concerns should follow their doctor's advice.

PRAYER / ALMSGIVING: Abstinence and fasting should lead Catholics to a deeper prayer life. Almsgiving provides an opportunity for a deeper understanding and response to the needs of the poor.


