

From the Desk of Fr. Dan

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens: a time to be born and a time to die. - Ecc 3:1-2

St. Teresa of Avila was the abbess of a cloistered, Carmelite community in the 16th century. One time on a fast day, the convent

received a generous donation of pheasant. So, being ever practical, St. Teresa cooked it up for the sisters. When some of the sisters were appalled that she would do this on a fast day, she said, "Let them think that they like. There is a time for penance, and there is a time for pheasant."

I often think of this as we move from the season of Lent into the season of Easter. The world thinks that we're nuts. We go from being scrupulous and sacrificial to being jubilant and celebratory basically overnight. It seems strange to many that this would be the case. But this is normal, healthy human behavior. We are meant to be very cyclical creatures. The earth itself is cyclical, as we move through the seasons of the year. It's interesting that as technology increases, we actually become less cyclical. I remember when fruit used to be seasonal. Now, you can get watermelon in winter if you want. The whole point of certain festive holiday foods was because we eat what is in season at that point in time. Now, if we want, we could have anything for Easter dinner. It is possible to live a life that is non-seasonal. Always the same, never changing.

Being the same all the time is unhealthy for us. Seasons are important. Some seasons are joyful; others are not. We all have our Lents and our Easters in life. It's helpful to remember that when things are difficult in life, it's only a season. It will change. At some point, our Lents will become Easters.

As Ecclesiastes 3 reminds us, there is a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance. Lent and Easter need one another in this life. Joy and sorrow, fasting and pheasanting accompany each other until we arrive at the final season in the next life - the eternal Easter where we leave sorrow and fasting behind & enter the fullness of joy forever.

THE UNFOLDING MESSAGE: BLESSINGS

HOSPITAL/NURSING HOME STAYS

Federal law has affected the longstanding practice of hospitals and nursing homes to provide information to Churches about parishioners who are patients/residents. Because of the privacy law, the priests & staff in the parish office are not always aware that a member has been admitted to a hospital or nursing facility. If you, or a member of your family are hospitalized or enter a long-term care facility, please call the office & identify the patient/resident, the hospital or nursing home and the room number. Direct notice to the parish from you or your family is a better approach to keeping us informed. If the parish does not receive word, Father will do his best to obtain information about parishioners, but hospitals & nursing homes are limited to divulge this information.

WHO IS CONSIDERED A PARISHIONER?

We are often asked how we define who is a parishioner. A parishioner is: *Baptized Catholic, *Registered member or one of our parishes, *Participant in the faith community of our parishes by regular Mass attendance here. If you are currently registered with your parents but are 18 or older, independent & employed (not a student), you should register individually as a parishioner. Those who aren't registered and who don't actively participate in the parish faith community aren't considered members. Baptism at any parish doesn't mean you're automatically considered a lifelong member.

What is a sponsor certificate & how is one obtained?

A sponsor certificate verifies that a person belongs to a particular parish and attends Sunday Mass regularly there. The certificate also verifies that someone fulfills all the Church requirements to be a sponsor for Baptism & Confirmation, including age, the completion of the Sacraments of Initiation, and if married, being in a valid marriage. Call the office if you need a sponsor certificate. Sometimes when a person is asked to be a sponsor, he or she is unsure of this role or the Church's expectations. Those who are choosing sponsors are advised to choose carefully.

Holiday meals have developed strong culinary traditions all over the world. Main Dishes



Eating lamb connects us to the Paschal

Lamb as well as the ancient Jewish Passover feast. In America, ham became common because meat butchered in the fall and smoked was ready to eat around Easter.

Eggs, butter, cheese

The Lenten fast was once much more stringent than what Roman Catholics are required to observe today. For 40 days, not only meat but animal products such as cheese, butter & eggs were offlimits. For this reason, those foods figure prominently in Easter culinary traditions.

Breads

In the Ukraine, a white bread called paska is decorated with religious symbols, including crosses, flowers, braids, & wheat. Ukrainians & Russians also eat babka or kulich, a tall cylindrical-shaped sweet raisin bread. The Dutch offer paasbrood, a sweet bread made with almond paste, raisins & candied nuts. In Spain, hornazo is stuffed with egg & sausage. In Italy, two sweet breads are common: colomba, shaped like a dove, and pane di pasqua, which may be in loaf form or braided with an egg in the center.
