

From the Desk of Fr. Dan

Every year there are news stories about how many American Catholics don't believe what the Catholic Church teaches. Admittedly, the Church's position on a lot of social, political, and sexual issues is not very popular. This has led to many people leaving the Church. These issues have also

been pushed by many news media outlets whose intention is to show that the Catholic Church is out of touch, is falling apart, and needs to change.

The trouble is, most of these issues being discussed are not at the center of our faith. If the Catholic faith is a tree, they are the leaves. A tree's health is determined not by the leaves but by the roots and the trunk. Some people leaving the Church are doing so because of the leaves, not because of the roots and the trunk. "The Church is sick. Just look at those leaves. Let's cut the tree down." This is a mistake.

If most people have problems with the leaves, then what are the roots and trunk of the Catholic faith? It's what we call the kerygma. Kerygma is a Greek word that means proclamation. The apostles went out after the feast of Pentecost to proclaim the message of resurrection, repentance, and baptism. This was a new, unheard message and it spread like wildfire wherever it was proclaimed.

2,000 years later, this kerygma still needs to be proclaimed. Many people associate Catholicism with its leaves and not its roots. I think that it's time to get back to our roots and remember the original message.

The diocese is hosting a retreat - appropriately called Kerygma - over the weekend of Pentecost for any adults who want to attend. The focus of the retreat is to tell the good news in a way that gets back to the heart of the message and stirs up deeper discipleship. St. Augustine once spoke of God as "ever ancient, ever new". Even though we are baptized and have already had Christ proclaimed to us, hearing it told again helps us to rediscover the roots of our faith.

I invite and encourage anyone to attend the retreat. Everyone can use some spiritual renewal once in a while to take time to think and ponder the core beliefs of our faith. I would especially invite anyone who is feeling a little lukewarm or struggling with their faith. It will be a time to be with God, rediscover the roots of our faith, and encounter Jesus in a way that is ever ancient, ever new. Notes from our Administrator, Fr. Paul:

WHAT IS A "SPONSOR CERTIFICATE" AND HOW IS **ONE OBTAINED?** A sponsor certificate verifies that a person belongs to a particular parish and attends Sunday Mass regularly there. The certificate also verifies that someone fulfills all the Church requirements to be a sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation, including age, the completion of the Sacraments of Initiation, and if married, being a valid marriage. A sponsor certificate can be obtained by calling the parish office. Sometimes when a person is asked to be a sponsor, he or she is not sure of this role or the Church's expectations. This becomes an opportunity for us to learn once again the meaning behind some of the practices of the Church. Those who are choosing sponsors are advised to choose carefully.

WHO IS CONSIDERED A PARISHIONER? We are often asked how we define who is a parishioner. A parishioner is: 1) Baptized Catholic; 2) Registered member of one of our parishes; 3) Participates in the faith community of our parishes by regular attendance at Mass. If you are currently registered with your parents but are 18 or older, independent and employed (not a student), you should register individually as a parishioner. Those who are not registered and who do not actively participate in the parish faith community are not considered members. Baptism at Visitation or St. Pius X or any other area parish does not mean you are automatically considered a lifelong member.

SOME REFLECTIONS ON MARRIAGE This is the time of year when a large number of weddings are celebrated by the Church. It's also a good time for us as members of God's family to review what we as Catholics understand marriage to be. We believe that marriage is more than a contract between a man and a woman. It is a covenant relationship of love and life for the Baptized; and intimate partnership rooted in the covenant of irrevocable personal consent. At the wedding feast of Cana, Jesus celebrated the gift of love in marriage and helped the couple celebrate their consent of selves to each other. He thus blessed their togetherness for life. Jesus Christ Himself becomes the third partner in the Christian marriage. We, as Catholics, validly receive the Sacrament of Matrimony when we exchange our consent with our partner in the presence of a priest and two witnesses. Once the covenant bond has been made, the marriage cannot be broken. However, sometimes a Catholic marriage ends in divorce. If a Catholic couple gets a civil divorce, they are not free to remarry. But the divorced couple can continue to receive the Sacraments as long as they don't attempt to remarry outside the Church and contradict the previous covenant. If the separated couple can give evidence to indicate that a covenant relationship doesn't exist, that for some reason there was not a free exchange of consent to the marriage, then an annulment procedure could begin. THIS WEDNESDAY, MAY 1, IS THE FEAST OF ST. JOSEPH THE WORKER. The liturgical celebration in honor of St. Joseph the Worker dates back to 1955 when it was established by Pope Pius XII, and first was celebrated the following year. Workers have long celebrated May 1 as May Day in honor of labor and as a

symbol of their rights. It was the intention of Pius XII to give a Christian dimension to this day, and to teach the dignity of human labor, with St. Joseph as a model for the laborer. Appropriately, in the Opening Prayer we note that God calls all of us "to develop and use (our) gifts for the good of others" and with St. Joseph as our example and guide, we ask that God help us to do what is His will for us. FOOD FOR THOUGHT ON THIS FIRST COMMUNION DAY

Mei was a little Chinese girl whose mother was put in prison for refusing to surrender her Catholic faith. This was in the 1950s. Since Mei was only three and had nowhere else to go, she stayed with her mother. The prisoners were all guarded carefully, but Mei was allowed to run about everywhere. Among the prisoners was a bishop and some priests. They couldn't say Mass, but there were still priests outside the prison who secretly sent in consecrated hosts hidden in loaves of bread that were sent to the prisoners. In that way the prisoners were able to receive Communion.

Once a Chinese woman was in solitary confinement and nobody was allowed to visit her, but the guards did not count Mei as somebody. So the little girl took the Blessed Sacrament to her. The host was hidden in her closed fist, demurely held in her sleeves. When Mei's mother was released, they returned to their village. There was still a missionary priest there, and Mei kept asking him to allow her to receive Communion. She was only four, but she knew all about it and how precious it was. The priest let her make her First Communion and a month later Mei was confirmed.
