



Notes from our Pastor, Fr. Paul:

THIS SATURDAY, OCTOBER 4, IS THE FEAST DAY OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI. The Church of Francis' day was wealthy and powerful, and most people did not have the courage to take the words of the Gospels literally. But Francis followed Christ's example. He became the "Poverella"—the "little poor one." He owned only one tunic, a plain brown robe with a rope for a belt, which was the garment worn by peasants when they labored in the fields. He worked with lepers, the most despised people of society. He acted as a peacemaker between warring towns. Soon others began to join Francis, earning their bread by working in the field or doing odd jobs. Francis had an understanding of the unity of all creation that was way ahead of the time. He addressed every created thing as a brother or sister and treated everything with reverence. He allowed the beauty of creation to fill him with joy. Francis became ill and died when he was only 45 years old. On his deathbed he composed the Canticle of the Sun, a hymn of praise still sung to this day. Then he asked to be laid on Brother Earth naked so he could welcome Sister Death as simply as possible. The pope who canonized him two years later described him as "the most perfect image of Christ." His body rests in the Basilica that was built at Assisi after his death. Francis of Assisi is a Patron Saint of Italy. In 1979, he was also named Patron Saint of ecologists and all people who work to protect the environment.

BLESSING OF ANIMALS In keeping with tradition of the Feast Day, we will have blessing of the animals this Saturday, October 4, in the St. Pius X parking lot at 1 p.m. All parishioners and friends are invited to bring their pets and other animals to this blessing service. In case of inclement weather, we will meet in the church hall.



PUBLIC ROSARY RALLY, to be held at the grotto at St. Rita Church on Saturday, October 11 at noon. The Catholic Church is in need of public prayer, repentance and conversion. Through Our Lady of Fatima's Rosary this will be done. Everyone is invited. Please bring a chair if you are unable to stand. The rosary will be held inside St. Rita Church if the weather doesn't cooperate.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 29th, is the Feast of Ss. Michael, Gabriel and Raphael. This great day is a triple celebration of the glory of God. The feast days of Michael, Gabriel and Raphael, who used to be remembered separately, have been combined into one joyful feast. It is called Michaelmas in some places. Although angels are mentioned in the Bible many times, only these three are specifically named. They are messengers of God, which is the meaning of the word

"angel." St. Michael's role was to defend Christians from the powers of evil. This day, which comes as the nights grow longer and longer, is the church's fearless welcome to the dark and cold. Michael's name means, "Who is like God?". The 12th chapter of the Book of Revelation tells of Michael casting out of heaven those angels who presumed that they were like God. Michael is considered the special protector of Israel and also the protector of the church. The Book of Daniel tells us that Michael will lead the dead to God on the day of resurrection. Gabriel was the archangel who brought the news that John the Baptist would be born to Zechariah and Elizabeth. It was Gabriel who appeared to Mary to ask her to become the mother of God. His name means "hero of God." The Book of Daniel says that Gabriel announced the end of the Jews' exile in Babylon. According to tradition, Gabriel will sound the trumpet to awaken the dead on the day of judgment.

Raphael's name means "God has healed." Raphael plays an important part in the Book of Tobit, where he guards a young man on a journey and restores sight to the man's elderly father. He describes himself as one of the seven angels who stand in the presence of God. In the Gospel of John, the healing pool where Jesus cured a paralyzed man was said to be a place where Raphael stirred the waters.

OCIA People decide to become a member of the Catholic Church for many reasons at different times in their lives. Sometimes, it's the desire to share in the same faith as a fiancée or child. Sometimes, it's because of the faith we see in someone else. Some people may have been going to Mass for years, but just never became Catholic. Some have always been drawn to Catholicism, but have never investigated it further. Maybe you or someone you know is at a crossroads in life and would like to explore the possibility of becoming a Catholic. Our parishes invite you to come and see what the Catholic faith is all about through the process of OCIA, the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. Through OCIA, those interested in the Catholic faith meet to learn about the Church and deepen their relationship with God. OCIA is for Christians of other denominations, for those of other faiths and those who have never received the Sacraments of Penance, Eucharist and Confirmation. TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 30th, is the Memorial of St. Jerome (hermit, presbyter, doctor of the church). Jerome was born in Dalmatia, along the coast of the Adriatic Sea. His parents were Christians, and they sent him to Rome for a good education. Jerome developed a passion for collecting books. After his schooling, Jerome lived as a hermit in the Syrian desert for five years. After living briefly in Rome, he traveled to the Holy Land and settled in Bethlehem. He began a scripture study group for upper class women. One devotee of his, Paula, helped Jerome found two monasteries, one for men and one for women, and a church to be used by both houses. In Bethlehem, Jerome devoted his life to study and meditation. With assistance from Paula & others, he completed the enormous task of translating the Bible from Hebrew and Greek into Latin. When he died, Jerome was buried under the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem.

Wednesday, October 1st, is the Memorial of St. Therese of the Child Jesus (religious, 1873-1897).

Marie Françoise Martin grew up in Lisieux in France. Her parents were wealthy and religious. Marie was their youngest daughter, so she received a lot of attention from her parents, sisters and the family servants. Marie was raised by her sister Pauline after their mother died. When Marie was nine, Pauline entered the Carmelite convent nearby. Marie began to long for the life of poverty and prayer at Pauline's convent. She obtained permission to join at the unusually early age of 15.

Marie was given the name Therese. (Many English-speaking people use the form Theresa.) Those in charge of the young nuns were especially strict with her. They wanted to make sure she didn't receive special treatment. In addition to her housekeeping tasks, she cared for the convent chapel and later took on much of the work of guiding the young nuns who had come into the convent after her. Therese's life centered around the gospels. She believed that any life could be a holy one. "To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul," she said. So she did her drab everyday chores with joy and love. Therese's patience was put to its greatest test when she developed tuberculosis, a deadly and painful lung disease. Just before she died, at the age of 24, she made a startling statement: "I promise to spend my heaven doing good on earth."

Therese wrote down her story because the leader of the convent had instructed her to do so. It wasn't intended for outside publication, only for the enjoyment of the sisters at other Carmelite convents. But they found it so helpful that they passed it on to their friends, and soon it was being read in many countries of the world. Therese's story gave its readers hope that they, too, could become saints, even if their lives were not spectacular in any way.



Thursday, October 2nd, is the Memorial of the Guardian Angels.

In the 18th chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus advises his followers to become like little children. "Take care that you do not despise one of these little ones," he says, "for I tell you, in heaven their angels continually see the face of my Father in heaven." His words are one source for the belief, held since the days of the earliest Christians, that every human has a guardian or protecting angel. "Angel" means messenger in Greek. Angels are mentioned often in scripture, where they are not only messengers but defenders, companions, guides and guardians. The Letter to the Hebrews describes them as spirits whose work is service. Guardian angels have a special task—to assist human beings in their journey toward God.

All the angels used to be remembered on the feast of Michaelmas (September 29). But people wanted a day to honor their own special protectors. And so today we continue the feast of the angels. The joy of this day is based on our sure knowledge of all the ways that God lovingly cares for us.



Please pray for our recently deceased, especially Tim Shay. Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.
