Notes From Our Pastor, Fr. Paul

QUALITY OF LIFE: "THE ONE WHO EXEMPLIFIED QUALITY" How well do you know this Jesus of Nazareth? Suppose that you were one of the disciples, but happened to be away from the others in some town in Judea or Galilee. A stranger, or a friend, asks, "What is Jesus like? What makes you want to be one of his followers?" These questions are some we might want to ask ourselves today. Although we have heard stories about Jesus all our lives, do we really know him? We do know that there was something about Jesus which made people flock to hear him. He struck a note of authenticity. He was genuine. His words rang true. He lived out what he taught. He was humble, yet confident. He upheld the old laws and traditions, yet he understood the need for compassion and understanding. For example, he healed a man on the Sabbath Day, even though such work was considered improper then. What Jesus taught was practical for everyday living. He understood the trials people face. To those in mourning he promised comfort. He said the downtrodden and meek would "inherit the earth." The merciful would receive mercy in return. When people felt unable to pray satisfactorily, he said, "Don't heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do." Pray as to a father, to someone close to us. The greatest benefit of knowing Jesus is the fact that we come to know what God is like. God is the source of truth. God is compassionate, loving and understanding. God accepts and forgives. God's laws were made not as a reason for punishing us for one misdeed, but as a guide for living life at its best. Jesus brings the divine and the human together. As we seek to bring greater quality into our lives, we do well to get to know the one who exemplified quality. We cannot equal him, but we can follow him as closely as possible.

NEXT SUNDAY, MARCH 29th, is Palm Sunday. Palms will be blessed and distributed at every weekend Mass. Weather and logistics permitting, there may be an outdoor procession at some of the Masses. This will occur at the beginning of the Liturgy, so please try to arrive a little earlier.

LENTEN GUIDELINES *Abstinence*: Catholics in the U.S. age 14 & older are obliged to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent & Good Friday. The church forbids use of meat, but doesn't prohibit eggs, milk products or condiments made with animal fat. ***Fasting*:** Catholics in the U.S. from the day after their 18th birthday until the day after their 59th birthday are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday. Church law allows for one full meal daily, but doesn't prohibit the taking of food in the morning & evening. The combined quantity of the two meals shouldn't exceed the quantity eaten at the full meal. The drinking of ordinary liquids doesn't break the fast. Note: Persons taking medication or with health concerns should follow their doctor's advice. ***Prayer/Almsgiving*:** Abstinence & fasting should lead Catholics to a deeper prayer life. Almsgiving provides an opportunity for a compassionate response to the needs of the poor.

THIS WEDNESDAY, MARCH 25th, is the solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord. According to the first chapter of Luke's gospel, the angel Gabriel came to tell Mary about God's plan of salvation. The angel announced that Mary was chosen to be the mother of Jesus, the Son of God. Mary freely answered, "Here I am, the servant of the Lord." Despite her puzzlement over the angel's mysterious words, she trusted in God's goodness. At Easter we take joy in the willingness of Jesus to be our Savior by his death and burial and rising. Today God begins that work by becoming flesh in Mary's womb. This mystery is expressed in the Angelus prayer, which some people recite at the beginning, middle and end of each day. Here are its final words:

Lord, fill our hearts with your grace: once, through the message of an angel, you revealed to us the incarnation of your Son; now, through his suffering and death, lead us to the glory of his resurrection.

Artists often show Mary in a garden when Gabriel appeared to her. They want to remind us of the garden of Eden, where Adam and Eve said "no" to God. Here, today, in a new garden, Mary said "yes." In ancient times, scholars worked out all the feasts of the year mathematically. They decided that March 25 is a remarkable day. They calculated that this is the day Jesus died on the cross. Perhaps too the Jews' exodus from Egypt and even the creation of the world began on this day. And if all those things occurred on this one wonderful day, then surely this must be the best day to begin each new year. For several hundred years, beginning in the 12th century, March 25 was the official New Year's Day in many Christian countries. This matches the practice of several other cultures and countries, such as Iran, which still begin the year at the vernal equinox. The Annunciation of the Lord is celebrated with symbols of the Holy Spirit, such as wind and fire. Christians in Greece fly kites on this holiday. Jamaicans have sailboat races. Scandinavian and French people make yeast-raised waffles and serve them with whipped cream. It is a day to search for signs of the newly arrived springtime.

Next Sunday, March 29th, is Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. Because there are four gospels, there are four accounts of the passion of the Lord. John's account is proclaimed every year on Good Friday. On Palm Sunday, the final Sunday of Lent, we hear one of the other three accounts. The vestments this day are red, just as they are on Good Friday. Most people call today Palm Sunday. It's a day for marching in processions. The gospels tell us that the people waved branches to welcome Jesus into Jerusalem. So today we too wave branches. The 40 days of Lent have been a time to travel in spirit to the holy city of Jerusalem. Today we enter the city. Any kind of branch can be used in the processions today. Olive branches are traditional because, ever since Noah's flood, they have been symbols of peace and forgiveness. In cooler climates, forsythia bushes, which are related to olives, come into bloom during this season. In most churches, palm branches are blessed and waved today. The Gospel of John mentions them specifically. In the Middle East, date palm trees grow in the incredible heat. In fact, they need several months of very high temperatures (100 degrees or more) to produce their sweet fruit. In warm climates people plant palms in cemeteries as a sign that life is stronger than death. For the same reason, people in northern countries plant pussy willows and evergreens. Then they cut branches from these plants for the Palm Sunday procession. In our country, most churches buy palms from florists. But there are places where people gather their own home-grown branches to bring to church. No matter where the palms and branches come from, they are all signs of life and resurrection. This Sunday is the last Sunday before the Paschal Triduum, our Passover festival. The branches help us to welcome the Passover.
