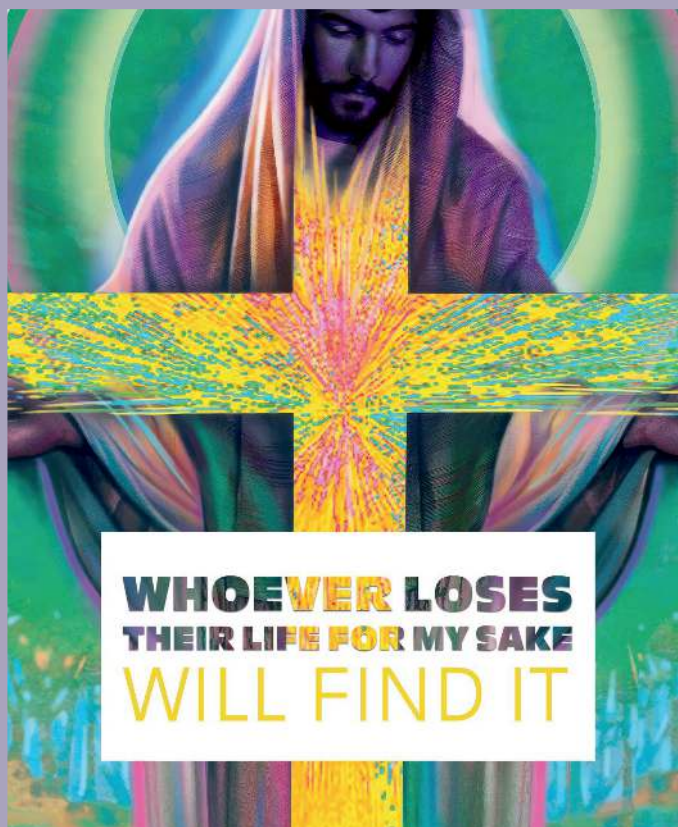

THIS SATURDAY, JULY 4th, is the 250th birthday of our country, the United States of America. We Americans have been a fortunate people. From our beginnings, we have never been oppressed by dictatorship; we are a democracy. While we have experienced the horror of war, we have never been invaded. While we have not always achieved the goal of liberty and justice for all, we haven't given up striving toward it. We are, indeed, most fortunate. But such good fortune is not a matter of luck, much less a matter of unmerited blessing. The freedom we have is a freedom we must responsibly maintain. Such freedom must be worked at. Given as a gift, it must be used with care and gratitude. Each of us is called upon to value the gift. We are called as Christians as well as Americans to pass along freedom of life and its happiness to one another without conditions or restraint. Equally so, the gift must be passed on to other peoples. Iraq and Afghanistan, North Korea and some of the African countries—these are just a few peoples who struggle for the freedom we have. WHY ARE SO MANY PEOPLE IN A HURRY TO GO? We have so many unofficial dismissals at Sunday Mass. The ritual of the Mass calls for one dismissal. We have the following: prior to communion, during communion, after receiving communion, and before the priest and ministers have exited. There are legitimate reasons for leaving Mass early, i.e., illness or emergency. By the number of people we have leaving early, we have an awful lot of emergencies or illnesses! The point is, if we can't spend an hour praising and thanking God on a weekly basis, there is a need to re-evaluate our priorities. Think about it! Don't be in such a hurry to leave the celebration of the Eucharist early. Stay until the celebrant has exited. Thank you!

MAINTENANCE PERSONNEL are employed by our parishes, but you can help! We're all responsible for the cleanliness and order of the church buildings. On weekends, place the hymnals back in the racks, put up kneelers, and take soiled tissues with you when you go. Being concerned for the condition of our buildings shows that we have pride in them. These may seem like insignificant items, but they can create a more hospitable place to worship our God. They show our Christian concern for our sisters & brothers, whether fellow parishioner or visitor, by maintaining our worship spaces.

Legend of the Wedding Ring

Long ago there lived a maid so fair and full of grace that princes journeyed from afar to gaze upon her face...and on the day she came of age, these suitors filled her hall in order that she might select a husband from them all. One by one each boasted of the riches he possessed and the wealth that could be hers if she would honor his request. But one tall suitor waited till all princely claims were read—then he knelt before the maiden's chair and this is what he said..."I cannot give you jewels or make you queen of all the land—the only gift I offer is this simple golden band. But let it be a symbol of the love I have for you, a love that is unending—everlasting, ever-new." So the gentle maid chose to wed this proud but humble man, and that is how the legend of the wedding ring began.



On Monday, June 29th, we celebrate the Feast of Ss. Peter & Paul. In the fourth century on this day, Roman Christians would follow the bishop in procession as he celebrated the liturgy first at the church of St. Peter (which was built over the saint's burial place) and then at the church of St.

Paul, outside the Walls, Rome isn't the only city that celebrates this great day. Today's celebration is kept by all the liturgical churches all over the world. Eastern churches even have a period of fasting to prepare for this feast.

Peter and Paul came from thoroughly different backgrounds and had different gifts, but they had one great bond: both were called forth by Jesus' love. Jesus gave Peter his name—which means "rock"—at their first meeting. Jesus had chosen him to be the rock upon which the new church would be built. According to the gospels, Peter often showed an understanding of Christ, but when

Jesus was arrested and crucified, Peter denied Christ three times and hid in fear. When Jesus was risen from the dead, He told Peter, "Feed my lambs." Peter was probably imprisoned three or four times before being martyred around the year 64 during the persecutions of the

Emperor Nero. According to legend, he asked to be crucified upside down, since he didn't feel worthy to die in the same way Jesus died. Early in his life, Paul persecuted Christians with determination. But then he had a vision of Jesus, which left him with a complete change of heart.

When Paul began preaching Christ, the Christians naturally were afraid of him. But over the next 30 years, Paul was able to convince them of his sincerity. Wherever Paul went, he left behind small Christian communities.

Paul preached to all classes of people. We know a lot about the person Paul from his letters to the various people and communities he cared about. His letters are the first Christian writings. They were written even before the gospels. Like Peter, Paul was martyred by Nero, perhaps around the year 67. Unlike Peter, Paul was a Roman citizen. This gave him the right to a trial and when he was convicted, to a quick execution. There is a legend that the city of Rome was founded by the brothers Romulus and Remus, who were raised by wolves. Peter and Paul came to be called the new founders of Rome.

Their solemnity is a grand holiday in the city.

I'd like to officially inform our parishioners of a change to our staffing. Mary Allison, who has been our Regional Director of Religious Education for the past couple years has been moved to another parish. Her last day was Sunday, June 14, and she'll begin her new job as Regional Director of Religious Education for the region around St. Barbara's Parish in Harrison City. Fr. Dan Carr is the administrator there. When I was notified on Thursday, June 4th, I expressed concern over the now-vacant position at our parishes and the continuation of programs. The Diocesan office has told me that filling this position is their highest priority. Their goal is to have someone for our region before the beginning of the school year. I will continue to keep you updated on this situation, religious education classes, and the sacramental preparation gatherings for the next school year, 2026-2027. ~Fr. Paul

June contains two solemnities that celebrate three of the greatest saints in Christianity: the Nativity of St. John the Baptist on June 24 and the Solemnity of Ss. Peter and Paul on June 29.

These saints are three giants in the story of Christ and our faith, and yet, at first glance, they seem to be very different from one another. What they share in common is something that we too share and must cultivate. They all had a profound encounter with Jesus. Peter had many encounters with the Lord. We don't know how long Jesus' public ministry was, but Peter was there for all of it. It seems that after Jesus was kicked out of Nazareth, he may have taken up residence in Peter's house in Capernaum. Peter ate with Jesus. He heard Jesus preach. He witnessed his greatest miracles. He was even chosen to be the "rock" on which Jesus was to found his Church. Yet Peter had his moment of weakness on Good Friday and even denied knowing Jesus. He had to encounter the Lord again, risen from the tomb, to be rehabilitated and called again to follow him.

Paul was different. Paul never met the Lord before the Resurrection. Paul only encountered the Lord the way we do: risen from the dead. Paul's encounter with the Lord was also life-changing. His name changed, his understanding of God's salvation changed. Paul's meeting with Jesus on the road to Damascus was not the only time he encountered the Lord. As he preached the Gospel, Paul continued to be guided and encouraged by Jesus. The heart of the Christian faith is our encounter with Jesus himself. Let us allow the Lord to follow him and reveal himself to us more deeply, as the great saints Peter and Paul did.
